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Hotel Resorts Being Planned for Soldiers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The war
department has announced the
army ground and service forces
are establishing rest centers in
some of the nation's leading resort
hotels for military personnel re-
turning from fighting fronts over-
seas.

The program is similar to one
already effected for airforce vet-
erans.

Men will receive "complete phys-
ical examinations" and each will
be evaluated as to his "most suit-
able new assignment," the depart-
ment said.

Five such "redistribution cen-
ters" were understood to be
planned to start operation in Sep-
tember. The department said "sev-
eral hotels at Miami Beach, Fla.,
have been acquired and are be-
ing made ready" with negotia-
tions under way at other unstated
locations.

Senator McClellan (D-Ark.)
said recently the program con-
templated installing 20,000 sold-
iers in the resorts every two weeks
for fortnightly sojourns.

The war department said it
could not list names and locations
of hotels until leaseings have been
completed.
