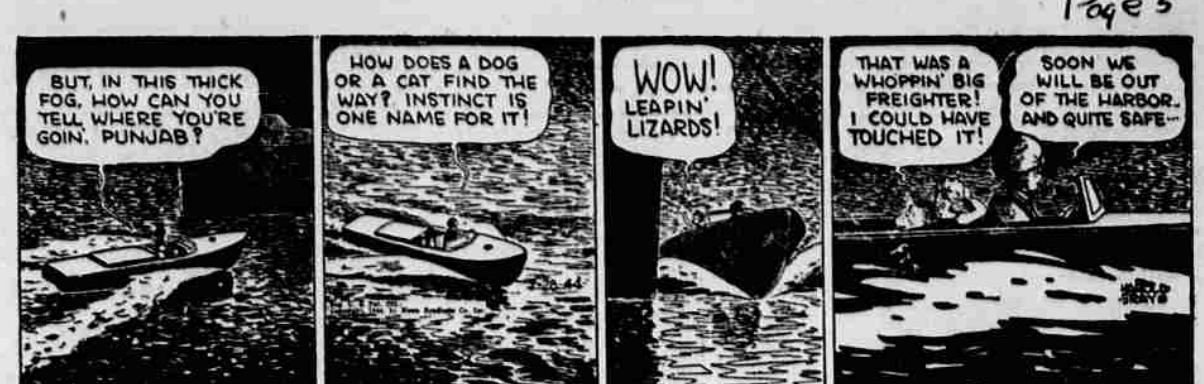
A grange picnic will be held Saturday in the evening at 7:30 at Hendricks bridge. All members and their families are invited and to bring a covered dish.

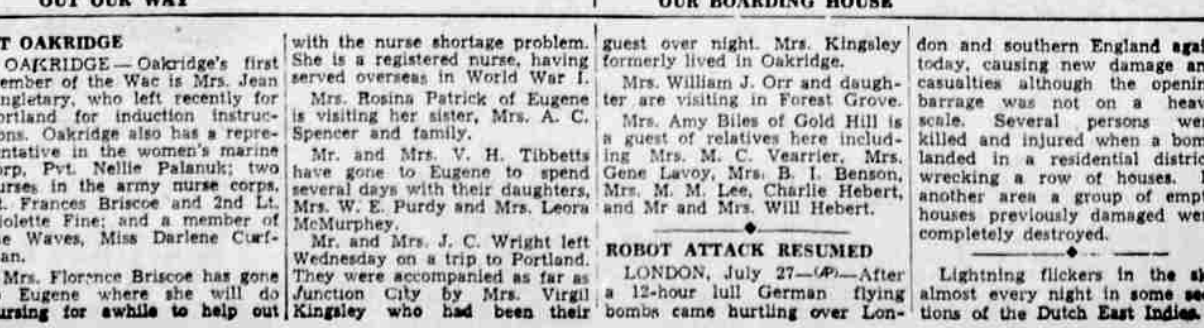
