

Rev. L. T. Holman Called To Home Of Missing Kin

Because his brother, Harold E. Holman, 29, navigator in the air transport command, has been reported missing with a transport plane between Iceland and Newfoundland, Rev. Lawrence T. Holman, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene in Eugene, has flown east to the home of the brother's wife and his mother, at Alexandria, Va.

Harold Holman was bound from Scotland to Mitchell Field, N. Y., with 18 wounded soldiers as passengers and eight crew members, but failed to arrive.

A message received from the plane shortly before it was reported overdue, said they were running short of fuel. As this is a regular run and had been made countless times before, running short of fuel was something which could not occur unless either sabotage or negligence had happened. A search is being conducted by 160 planes and numerous coast guard crafts, not so much in hope of finding survivors in the icy waters, as of finding some clue which will give explanation of the accident.

Mrs. Grace Holman of Glendale, Calif., the mother, had gone east to visit, only recently. She had been at her son's home but a few days when he was called to duty on this trip which was to take but four days.

Harold Holman formerly lived in Glendale, Calif., also, as an employe of Transcontinental Western Air lines.

Upshaw to Speak

Wm. D. Upshaw, for eight years a member of the United States congress from Georgia, will speak at the First Baptist church Thursday at 8 p. m. His subject will be "Who Shall Rule the World—God and the Right or Hitler, Japs and the Devil?"

Capture Of Florence Believed Imminent

ROME, Aug. 1.—(AP)—British and German forces locked in a swaying battle of tanks and infantry in the outskirts of Florence today and official reports said the 8th army veterans were slugging forward yard by yard against some 50,000 to 75,000 crack Nazi troops manning the last hill defenses before the city.

(London dispatches intimated that the fall of Florence was imminent, reporting that Gen. Sir Harold R. L. G. Alexander, allied commander in Italy, had appealed to patriots inside the city to prevent the retreating Germans from blowing up bridges and communications.

Four miles to the east, south African units beat off strong enemy counterthrusts against San Andrea, while other British units on their right flank battled German infantrymen defending the Greve river crossings about seven miles south of Florence.

Draft Status Shifts For Men Over 25

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—(AP)—State draft directors have been ordered to resume drafting men over 25 who are making no contribution to the war effort.

The order, selective service officials said today, took the form of a letter from Draft Director Lewis B. Hershey directing them to conform to the national policy. This policy permits deferment of men 28 through 29 only if they are "necessary men" in essential industry and men 30 and over only if they are making a substantial contribution to the war.

July Building Here Totalled \$31,793

Construction in Eugene declined in July from totals reached during the preceding three months, but still showed a high level for wartime with a \$31,793 total. This amount included 137 permits, 20 for new structures and 117 for repairs.

Repair work during the month was \$19,798, and new structures started are valued \$11,995, according to City Engineer W. C. Clubb. The total is more than double that for July 1943, which came to \$12,327.
