## Government Horse Auction Wednesday

More than 250 surplus government horses are being auctioned off at different points on the Oregon coast, one lot to be offered Wednesday at Lake Tahkenitch coast guard station, according to announcement received at the office of O. S. Fletcher, county agent. Among these animals are those that have been used by the coast guardsmen along the beach in Lane county.  
 These horses are broken and gentle and are in good condition, says the bulletin received by Fletcher. They are of riding, cavalry and light artillery types and the average weight is 1150 pounds, the average age being ten years. The procurement division of the U. S. treasury is selling them.  
 The sale began Tuesday at Myrtle Point, where 50 horses were offered. There will be a sale at the coast guard beach patrol station at Lake Tahkenitch south of Florence Wednesday, 60 being up for auction; one Thursday at Tillamook where 55 will be sold and one at the coast guard beach patrol station at Gearhart, where there will be 65. A fifth sale will be held at Hoquiam, Wash., Aug. 5. All these sales begin at 1 p. m.

## Pear Prices Based on \$73 Per Ton to Grow

PORTLAND, Ore., (AP)—The war food administration's regional office of distribution has announced that processor ceiling prices on the 1944 pack of canned and frozen pears will be based on an average price of \$73 a ton to Oregon-Washington growers.  
 The raw material cost allowance of \$75 per ton for No. 1 grade and \$43 a ton for No. 2 grade pears should result in the \$73 average if the proportion of the two grades is about normal, said Donald E. Wilcox, fruit and vegetable representative.  
 Prices specified are the minimum canners must pay to be eligible in the WFA support program, added Wilcox, but canners are not prohibited from paying more, and it is expected proper differentials will be paid for special lots such as extremely large pears.

## Regulations Shown For Christmas Mail

August 1 is not too early to begin thinking about Christmas presents for overseas GIs, was the startling statement made Tuesday by Eugene's postmaster F. L. Armitage who announced that the war and navy departments (including the marines and coast guard) will begin accepting September 15 Christmas parcels for members of the armed forces serving outside the continental U.S.  
 Postmaster Armitage explained that the armed forces overseas includes the military personnel, who receive mail through APO or fleet post office in care of the postmaster of New York, San Francisco, New Orleans, Seattle, or an APO in care of the postmaster at Miami, Presque Isle, Me., or Minneapolis, or through naval installation or station in care of the postmaster of Seattle.  
 No requests from the addressees are required in connection with Christmas parcels mailed to army personnel. Each gift parcel should be marked "Christmas parcel". Christmas greeting cards must be sent in sealed envelopes and prepaid at the first class rate. Postmaster Armitage released the following regulations to help the public in its selection of gifts:  
 Parcels may not exceed the present limits of five pounds net measure more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. Food and clothing are two items the war and navy department urge the public not to send, as all members of the armed forces are amply provided with these. Not more than one
