Radio Fire Control Gets Grazer's Praise

BOISE, Idaho — (AP) — Radio-controlled fire fighting, the United States grazing bureau said here, "is proving its efficiency in detection, communication and actual suppression" of blazes which threaten the nation's range and forest lands.

Regional Grazer Kelson P. Newman said 115 fires—most of them set by lightning—have been controlled in Idaho since July 1, an average of one every eight hours. They range from tiny fires which are curbed before they burn over more than a few square yards, to the 30,000-acre blaze that blackened rangeland in the desolate wastes northeast of the craters of the moon monument in south-central Idaho.

WITH AMERICAN TROOPS, France — (AP) — A bulldozer ordinarily is used to dig and smooth the roads, but Pvt. John R. Brewer, 22, of Trenton, Tenn., charged a nazi machinegun nest with his and buried alive three enemy gunners who had been holding up an American advance.

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Dynamite Hauler Escapes From Fire

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. — (AP) — When a truck laden with 1,500 pounds of dynamite caught fire here, the driver stayed at the wheel until he was able to maneuver his dangerous cargo into a field well off the highway.

Passing motorists went to his help but the driver, Lynn Stackler, Lindsay, Calif., shouted them off and after he made his way to safety the explosive let loose with a roar heard over a radius of 10 miles.

No one was hurt, reported state highway patrol Capt. Roy Galyen, but parts of the disintegrated truck were found more than a quarter of a mile away.

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
