SAN DIEGO, Calif.—A Camp Pendleton pharmacist's mate, B. S. Shope of Missoula, Mont., has claimed credit for ending Lawrence Schone's long period of hiccoughing in Los Angeles.

Shope said in a marine corps news release that electric shock treatment had failed to effect a permanent cure. The bluejacket said he cured Schone by massaging his feet.

Relating details of the treatment he used, Shope said Schone went to sleep after his feet had been massaged for an hour, the first natural sleep since the hiccoughs started.

Upon awakening after the foot-rubbing, Schone was able to eat his first meal without hiccoughs returning, the sailor stated. Shope said he used the same treatment to cure a marine at Camp Pendleton several months ago.

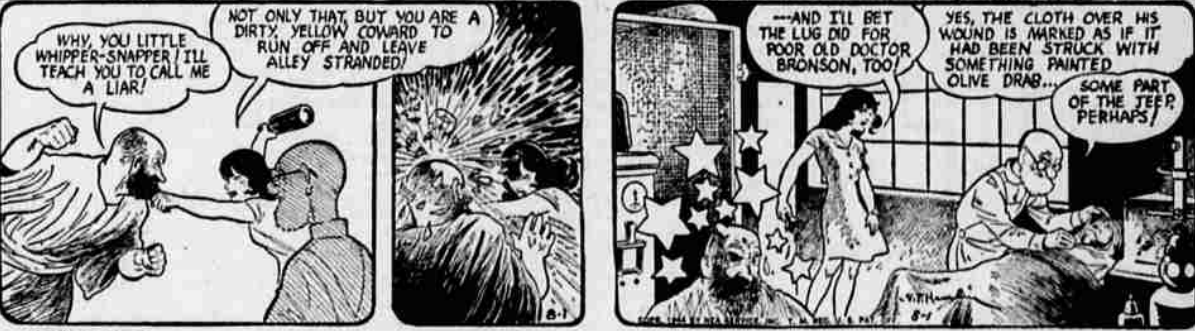
