\$25,000 Fire Levels Iseli Mill, Saginaw
SAGINAW — Fire Tuesday morning destroyed the Iseli Lumber company sawmill here, causing loss of perhaps \$25,000. The mill and machinery, as well as the dock and considerable sawed lumber and two empty boxcars were lost in the blaze, which is believed to have been started by sparks from the burner. The mill employed between 20 and 25 men. The mill was located right at the Saginaw community and east of the Pacific highway between the river and the tracks.

Eugene in July—Sun Shone Every Day and Rain Was Almost Zero
Average temperature for July was slightly above normal, the U. S. weather bureau's monthly report reveals, the mean temperature being 66.8, a departure of plus .7.

On two different days in the month, July 18 and 27, the mercury climbed to 94 degrees, the high mark of the season to date; while the minimum for the month dropped only to 42, on July 3.

Precipitation for the month was below normal, too, only .01 of an inch being recorded officially, a departure of -.37 of an inch. The rain fell on July 19. Two light thunderstorms were recorded for the month, on July 18 and 19; and fog, a light fog, was registered for only one day, July 30. Prevailing wind of the month was north. There were 15 clear days, 16 partly cloudy ones, none all cloudy.

Officers Give Their Guns To Soldiers During Saipan Battle
WITH 27TH INFANTRY DIVISION ON SAIPAN — (AP) — Two army officers gave their weapons to soldiers during the height of a battle against overwhelming enemy forces, but continued to lead their men against fierce Japanese counter thrusts.

Maj. Edward A. McCarthy, 39, Schenectady, N. Y., gave his pistol to one man and his carbine to another who turned up weaponless. Later one of his men gave him a captured Japanese pistol on which he relied throughout the rest of the battle.

"After the battle when I tried to unload it," McCarthy said, "I found it was frozen harder than a block of ice. It was just plain luck that I didn't have to use it."

After giving away his weapons, Lt. Chester W. Sillman, 29, Seattle, Wash., picked up an enemy pistol and threw it away. He went through the battle armed with a large chunk of coral.
