

War Loan Sets Finance Record

WASHINGTON.—The \$16-
million war loan exceed-
ed by \$4,639,000,000, es-
tablishing a new record for a war
loan.

The sale total of
the \$16 million Secretary of the
Treasury called it
a "new record" and a "remarkable
achievement" and said it was the
"wholehearted be-
lief of all the American
people."

The sale was made for
war loans. It may open
the way to a new day, and close
the era of the attack
on the dollar, but the dates
of the sale have not been de-
termined.

The sale exceeded their
previous record of \$11,361,000,000 in the fifth
year of the war, while
the previous record was exceeded by \$330,
000,000.

Scout Tells Reason For Giving His Life

ROCHESTER, N. Y. — (AP) —
A 20-year-old former Rochester
Boy Scout, who said he was
"willing and eager" to do his part
"so that boys of the future may
enjoy the countless benefits of
our great (Scout) organization,"
has been killed in action in Nor-
mandy.

Pvt. Frank C. Maracle, U. S.
medical corps, made the asser-
tion in a letter written to Roch-
ester troop 24 on the day of his
induction, Feb. 13, 1943. To be
opened "if I fail to return." His
mother delivered the letter here,
after being notified by the war
department of his death.

Private Maracle wrote:
"I was a 'wise guy' in my ten-
derfoot days. I knew all the an-
swers. . . . But I slowly began
to realize the troop leaders weren't
just a bunch of dopes slinging
orders around. . . . I understood
why I was asked to do this or
that, instead of being ordered. A
scoutmaster can't run a troop
with an iron fist. . . .
"I have lived for scouting and
now I am ready to die for it. If
I can do my part to keep America
alive, so that boys of the future
may enjoy the countless benefits
of our great organization, I am
willing and eager."

Waterfront Labor Office to be Opened

PORTLAND, Ore. — (U.P.) —
An office for labor recruitment
and utilization of waterfront man-
power for Columbia and Willam-
ette river operations probably
will be established in Portland,
George Hillebrand of San Fran-
cisco, vice chairman of the Water-
front Employers association of the
Pacific coast, said here.

Hillebrand was commenting on
discussions undertaken by the
board here on manpower and
transportation problems for this
area. He said the issue of pay
increases for longshoremen was
not discussed.

Donald W. Allton Is Successor to Evans



DONALD W. ALLTON

Appointment of Donald W. All-
ton, Staunton, Va., as assistant
professor of organ and theory at
the University of Oregon begin-
ning fall term, is announced by
Dr. Theodore Kratt, dean of the
University of Oregon school of
music. Allton replaces John Stark
Evans, resigned.

Allton received his undergrad-
uate and graduate training at the
Eastman school of music of the
University of Rochester, N. Y. He
holds the bachelor of music and

master of music degrees from this
school. He studied organ with
Abel Decaux, who was formerly
organist of the Basilica de Sacre
Coeur, Paris, and a teacher at
both the Schola Cantorum, and
Paris conservatory. Allton is a
member of the American Guild
of Organists, and holds the de-
gree of A.A.G.O. from that or-
ganization.

His experience covers numer-
ous organ positions; he comes to
the university from Mary Bald-
win college, Staunton, Pa., where,
for the past two years, he has been
serving as head of the depart-
ment of music. From 1938 to 1942
Allton was a member of the fac-
ulty of the school of music, Uni-
versity of Kentucky, teaching or-
gan and theory. Dr. Kratt said
the new professor has concentra-
ted extensively throughout the
New England states and New York
state.

Allton will be presented in a
formal organ recital in the school
of music auditorium early in the
fall.

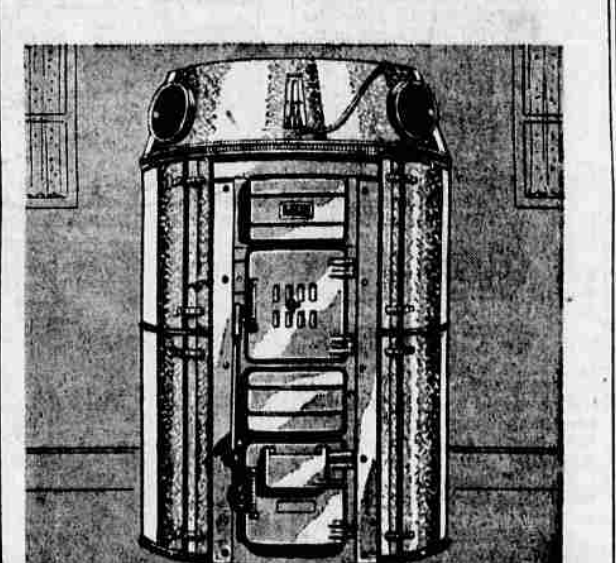
Mitchell Navy Man Wounded in Action

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. — (AP) —
The navy department announced
189 casualties today in all naval
forces.

Included was Sgt. Edmund C.
Norton Jr., U.S.M.C., who was
wounded in action. He is the son
of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund C. Nor-
ton Sr., of Mitchell, Ore.

This announcement brought to-
tal naval casualties to 51,871, in-
cluding 21,816 dead, 15,883
wounded, 8,703 missing, and 4,469
prisoners of war.
