

Dead In Guam Attack Buried

MARINE CEMETERY, Guam, July 23—(Delayed)—On this red clay hill, overlooking the town of Agat and the sea beyond, lie the first dead of our invasion. Twenty-four hours ago it was a battlefield where we killed 68 Japs.

Burial services have just been concluded for 60 marine officers and men, including two "unknowns" who will be identified later by their fingerprint records. A Jap shell exploded within 200 feet of the cemetery while services were being read, but they continued. Coconut trees waved in the breeze, and American artillery shells whirled overhead en route to demolish enemy positions.

Services were conducted by the Catholic chaplain, Lt. John P. Bordenet of Terre Haute, Ind., formerly a missionary for Mary Knoll Fathers, and Protestant Chaplain Lt. Murray O. Johnson of Arlington, Texas.

Under the direction of Capt. H. R. Razmus of Grand Rapids, Mich., bulldozers scooped a wide trench in which two rows of 30 marines each were placed.

A palm frond was placed over each body. After the burial, a white wood headstone was placed to mark the position of each marine.

More than a hundred men working in the area stopped and watched as the burial service began.

Oregon Unaffected By New Draft Order

SALEM, Ore.—The order from national selective service headquarters to draft men over 26 years old who are not in essential occupations will have no effect on Oregon, because that has been the policy in this state, Col. Elmer V. Wooten, state selective service director, said here.

Col. Wooten said that several months ago, state selective service directors were given permission to stop drafting all men over 26, but that Oregon chose to draft men over that age if they were in unessential occupations. This was necessary, he said, to enable the state to fill its draft quotas.

He said that 80 per cent of Oregon draftees now are under 26, 13 per cent between 26 and 29, and 7 per cent are 30 or over.

Twine and Hawser Sales Restricted

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Sharp restrictions in sales and delivery of seine twine, hawser, or other cable cord, have been announced by the war production board.

WPB explained the directives are necessary because of military and naval needs, including army needs for great quantities of seine cord for camouflage net and the war food administration's requirements for fishing nets.

Effective Aug. 15 producers may neither sell nor deliver any of this twine or cord except on priority bases.

Exceptions to these restrictions include sales directly from producers to consumers who need not more than 25 pounds per month, and deliveries made before Oct. 1 on orders accepted before Aug. 15 from the army, navy, maritime commission and war shipping administration.

Wickard Warns Farm Land Boom Developing

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3—(AP)—Another disastrous farm land boom is developing. Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard said today as he urged would-be purchasers to use extra money to retire debts or to purchase war bonds rather than to buy farm real estate at present inflated values.

The secretary's comments were made in connection with an agriculture department survey showing that war markets for farm commodities have boosted land values an average of 42 per cent above the average prevailing in the 1935-39 period.

Wickard, on a number of occasions, has recommended government measures designed to put a brake on rising land values. Those outlined by him as worth considering include: (1) restriction of credit; (2) establishment of ceiling prices on land and the issuance of permits to purchase; (3) imposition of a transfer tax; and (4) imposition of a capital gains resale tax.

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3 1/2 Cups Juice
4 1/2 Cups Sugar
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash 3 quarts of fully ripe berries. Crush thoroughly and squeeze out the juice. Measure exactly 3 1/2 cups of the juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/4-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

Oregon Trucks Making Tires Last, Says Flagg

SALEM, Ore.—(UP)—The motor transportation industry of Oregon is "getting the last particles of service out of every tire and vehicle," Public Utilities Commissioner George Flagg said here.

Fees paid by motor carriers for July reached an all time high this year, he said, notwithstanding the extreme scarcity of tires and replacement parts, and the dwindling number of carrier vehicles.

A total of \$195,155.41 in fees was paid last month, he reported, or \$16,091.97 more than for July 1943, and the increase in fees for the first six months of the year was 8.73 per cent above the same period last year.

Rejuvenated Jap Equipment in Use

WASHINGTON, (AP)—Rebuilt and remodeled, Japanese equipment salvaged by the navy's Seabee units is helping to drive the former owners from their Pacific bases.

This was disclosed by the navy here in announcing that much enemy equipment has been salvaged by the Seabees for future use in the Pacific area.

Examples include: trucks and motorcycles salvaged at Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands under the leadership of Comdr. Fremont G. Elliott, Clayton, Mo.

Japanese generators rehabilitated at Tarawa by Seabees commanded by Lt. Clarence D. Arrasmith, southwest Pacific.
