EUGENE
Local fruits and vegetables are arriving in market in large quantities and everything appears to be of fine quality. Peaches are ripening fast and it is said that Lane county has the largest crop of this product in several years. Yellow Transparent and Gravenstein apples are demanding a premium for the season for their ripeness is past but still some of a number of varieties are still to be seen. Corn is ripening rapidly and growers are being paid 40 cents a bushel. At the public market, peaches and plums were on sale in large quantities Saturday. The early apples were also displayed in the vegetable line, local cucumbers, string beans, both green and wax, corn, celery, carrots, onions, zucchini, radishes, lettuce, peas and new potatoes, all home grown, were displayed. There was a good supply of dressed poultry and rabbits.

Names were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

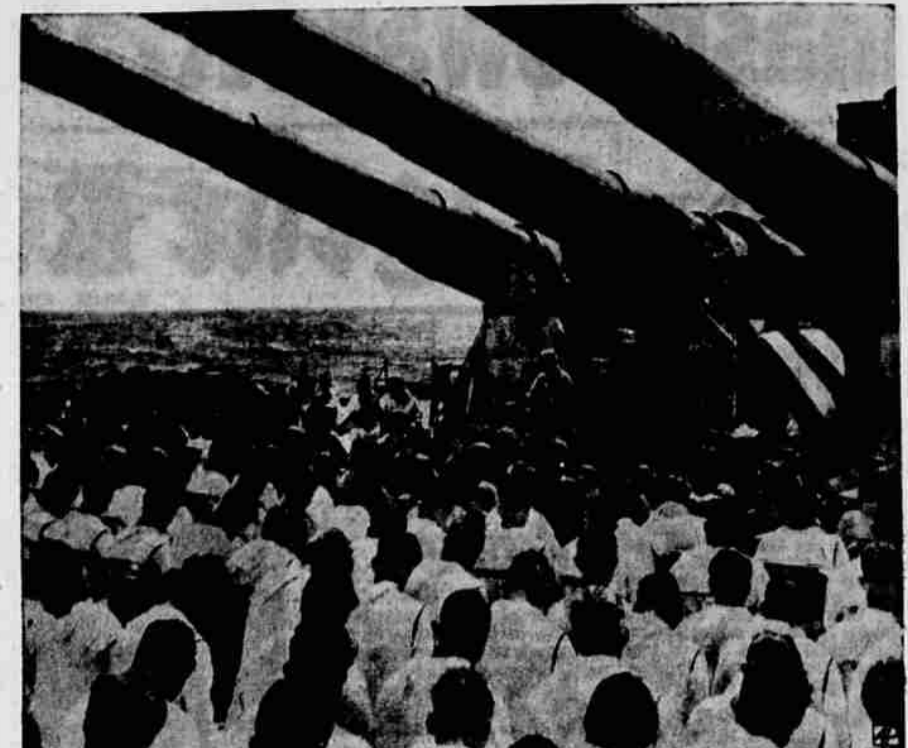
Germans Reported Quitting Finland

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Columbia Power Future Stressed

PORTLAND — (AP) — The Columbia river has the greatest potential hydro-electric possibilities of any river in the United States, possibly in the world, a member of the joint U. S.-Canadian river commission said here after a 2000-mile survey of the Columbia course.
"There will be a continuous succession of dams some day from tidewater to the Canadian border," said Roger McWhorter, U. S. commissioner of the federal power commission, and a member of the survey group.
Development of river transportation and power have nowhere reached the zenith in the north-west, he said.
He mentioned Umatilla, Foster creek, below Coulee dam in Washington, and other sites between Foster creek and Bonneville as locations for post-war dam construction. He denied that Oregon and Washington will be "top heavy" with power.

At New Georgia on July 16, 1943, he crawled under exposure to enemy machinegun fire to give first aid to a wounded soldier, the citation said.

Canada Plans to Bar Japs Following War
OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Complete exclusion of Japanese immigration after the war was announced here as a government policy by Prime Minister MacKenzie King.
A special commission will be set up to determine which Japanese now in Canada are loyal and which disloyal, he said. Those disloyal would be sent to Japan, whether or not they were born there. Those loyal would be treated justly, but would not be allowed to congregate again in British Columbia, he said.
