McMillin to Coach College All-Stars For Pro Battle

CHICAGO, Aug. 5—(AP)—Head football coach Alvin (Bo) McMillin of Indiana University, who led the 1938 Allstars to a 28-18 victory over the Washington Redskins, will be assistant coach of the 1944 allstars who play the world's champion Chicago Bears at Doyne stadium, Aug. 30, it was announced today.

McMillin will return to the annual August classic with one of his greatest Indiana backfields: Billy Hillenbrand, Chuck Jacoby, Lou Saban and Him Dewar of 1941-42, all members of this year's all star squad. The famous quarterback of Uncle Charlie Maran's old praying Colonels at Centre College, McMillin is starting his 11th season at Indiana and is dean of western conference football coaches in length of service at one school.

A 50-man collegian squad is expected to report for training next Saturday at Northwestern University, headed by such All-American backs as Bill Daley of Minnesota-Michigan and Glen Dobbs of Tulsa.

Navy Reports Five Oregon Casualties

ANKARA, Aug. 5—(AP)—A mass revolt was developing tonight among Germans in Turkey against returning to their homeland despite hints by the Gestapo that reprisals would be taken against members of their families in Germany.

A persistent report here following the breaking of relations with Germany said that Franz von Papen, Nazi ambassador to Turkey, would not return to the reich despite the fact his family was in Germany. Earlier reports said von Papen left by air for Germany two days ago.

Up to late this afternoon only enough Germans had applied for reservations to fill one sleeper of the five trains the Turks made available for those wishing to return. A German source estimated that at least 50 per cent of the 3,000 Germans in Turkey would choose internment or closely-controlled freedom rather than return to the reich.

Grand Trapshooting Meet to Spot Champs

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 5—(AP)—The champion of champions competition—for state trapshooting titlists only—promises to be the most interesting on the scattering program when the 45th annual grand American, world series of trapshooting, is held here Aug. 23-25.

Due to the shortage of shotgun shells, not all the states are holding runoffs this year, but at least 25 will compete for the national title here.

The favorite to date is Herschel Cheek of Clinton, Ind., outstanding target-buster in the 1943 Grand American. He recently broke 100 in a row in his state meet.

Mack Declares Pennant Race Hottest He's Ever Seen
