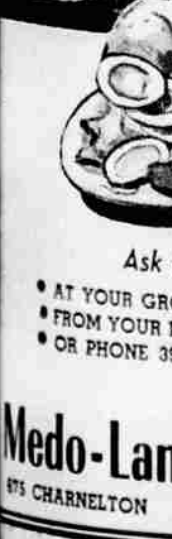

Peach Growers to Set Local Prices

A meeting of peach growers of Lane county has been set for Wednesday, Aug. 9, at 8 p.m. at the public market building to discuss the retail price of peaches this year. It is announced by Roy Corum, president of the Lane County Peach Growers' association.

A very large crop is in prospect in Lane county this year. There is also a large crop in the states of California and Washington, and for this reason it is desired to place the local price at such a figure that Lane county housewives will be able to put up much more of the crop than usual, thus taking care of the surplus, if there is a surplus that the cannery of the Eugene Fruit Growers' association cannot handle.

If the local price of peaches is set too high, truckers from California and Washington will flock into Eugene and other Lane county communities with the peaches from those states and sell them at a much lower price, it is pointed out.

Captain Arey Awarded Star For Gallantry



CAPTAIN AREY

A silver star decoration for gallantry in action has been awarded to Capt. Carlyle W. "Whit" Arey, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. T. Arey of Eugene. The news was received by Captain Arey's wife, Mrs. Eva H. Arey of Springfield.

The citation which accompanied the award stated it was given "for gallantry in action. Captain Arey, without regard for personal safety, accompanied the supply trains each day to the most forward areas through enemy-infested territory. During the battle, he led the trains through enemy snipers and knee mortar fire successfully, bringing vital ammunition, water and rations to the fighting troops. By his coolness under stress he served as an inspiration to all who worked with him. His strict devotion to duty under trying circumstances and his repeated display of personal courage and ability contributed materially to the success of his regiment's operations."

Captain Arey has been through the previous campaigns in Australia and New Guinea. He has been overseas with an infantry regiment since April, 1942, and has been in the service since the mobilization of 1940.

Maj. Booth Landed on Beach Shown in R-G

Two pictures published by the Register-Guard soon after D-day, depicting American soldiers landing on the shores of Normandy, were cut out by Major Robert P. Booth and returned to his family here with comment that the scenes were very familiar, since they showed the beachhead on which he landed. Some of his comments in a letter follow:

"Pictures were taken on the beach where I landed some time earlier. Although they do not give the name of the beach in the heading, I'll never forget it as long as I live. The trench wall is not a trench, but a concrete seawall with sand dunes on inland side over which the soldiers are rushing. The trench as it appears in picture was dug by soldiers where beach meets the seawall. It was used by assaulting troops as a protection against pill boxes along the tops of the sand dunes, and German artillery was zeroed in on the beach. Later, it was used by engineers who operated the beach landings. The other picture, showing a LCT, is the same kind of craft I made the trip from England in. We had it loaded with jeeps and men. Everyone lived on open deck as they have only enough room to quarter the crew. As you can see they are open on the top, and spray often came over front and sides. Of course our vehicles were water proof so they would run underwater. Actually as I drove over the ramp the water was over the steering, yet the darn thing putted right up on the beach and is still going strong..."
