Another Sawmill At Grove Starting Soon

COTTAGE GROVE — Another sawmill will be in operation soon in this vicinity. Charles E. Dillman, who formerly resided in Burns, and L. E. Guley of Florence, have announced that they have taken over the Albert Woodard mill east of Cottage Grove. The work of repairing the plant has already been started, and the owners expect to be able to get the mill working again in about two weeks. It is expected that there will be about 10 or 15 men employed at the mill at the start of operations, but the force will be increased later. The plant will have a capacity of 35 to 40 thousand feet of lumber daily, but the preliminary cut is expected to average from 15 to 20 thousand feet a day. The enterprise will be known as the Dillman-Guley Lumber company.

SEATTLE — Under pretense of answering recruitment drives, thousands of juvenile "hoboes" are drifting from war plant to war plant across the nation, Seattle police disclosed.

The youths, glibly offering labor recruiters forged birth certificates and social security cards, receive advance pay and accept employment. After traveling to the war plant, they work a day or two and then move on, police said.

More than 100 of the youths have been arrested in Seattle during the past three months and returned to their home towns with the warning not to come back unless they "mean business and work."

Capt. George W. Kimball described one town in Montana as a notorious source of boys on the bum. Seattle, he said, once was flooded with youths from that town until police contacted authorities there and explained the situation.

Brooklyn Church Leader To Speak

Dr. J. Henry Carpenter, prominent Brooklyn, N. Y., churchman and leader in the cooperative movement in this country, will visit Eugene Monday, filling two speaking engagements. At the Kiwanis club luncheon at the Osburn hotel he will speak on "I Saw New China." At 8 p. m. he will address a public meeting at Westminster House, 1414 Kincaid, on "Cooperation in the New World."

Dr. Carpenter, long active in the cooperative movement, is chairman of the Federal Council of Churches committee on the church and cooperatives and chairman of the four committee of the Cooperative League of the USA. In the latter capacity he has led tours of cooperatives in Nova Scotia, Europe, and this country and has visited cooperatives in Newfoundland and Mexico.

In 1942, at the invitation of Dr. H. H. Kung, vice president and minister of finance for the Chinese government, he inspected the industrial cooperatives in China. For this purpose he made a six-month trip to China, visiting on his way cooperatives in South America, north and south Africa, and India. The findings of his tour in China he reported to the Chinese government and to the American committee in aid of Chinese industrial cooperatives, of which he was chairman at the time.

Dr. Carpenter is a leader in religious circles in New York city and vicinity, being secretary of the Brooklyn Church and Mission federation and New York correspondent for the Christian Century. He comes to Eugene on a tour of the western part of this country and Canada, which he is making under the auspices of the Cooperative League of the USA.

Perseid Meteors Are Again In Merry Flight Across Sky

Despite the noise of bursting bombs and the terrifying illuminations of war, not all the speeding lights of the night are intent on cruelly destroying earth's creatures. Each year, without fail, watchers of the sky are cheered by the noiseless, merry flights of the Perseid meteors across the blue of the August sky.

In some countries these meteors are known as the "tears of Saint Lawrence." Yellow in color, they often trace long arcs across the sky, sometimes leaving trails of light that remain visible for several seconds.

Although the Perseids actually begin to appear late in July, yet not until about August 10 is the display very noticeable. The maximum numbers usually appear on the nights beginning with the evenings of the 10th, 11th and 12th. But even on these nights the term "shower" is misleading, for seldom can one person count more than 60 or 70 in an hour even under the most favorable conditions.

These meteors travel in the orbit of Tuttle's comet and are likely disintegration products from that comet. The Perseids seem to be quite evenly distributed around the entire orbit, which is so large that a little over 100 years are required for each individual meteor to make the round trip.

The earth touches the Perseid orbit once a year. Then many of these dark bits of matter dash into the earth's atmosphere and, heated by friction, are destroyed in a "blaze of glory" and are then lost forever to the meteor stream.

This might be likened to a 10-ton truck constantly traveling a long circular road which at one place intersects a very busy cross-country highway that is alive with tiny rolling hoops. A few of the

small objects would be wrecked by the larger one, but most of them would fly past never to encounter it again.

When sky conditions are favorable, the highest hourly count of Perseids may usually be obtained during the few hours before dawn. This year, however, the last quarter moon will interfere with morning counts. But since the moon will not rise until midnight on the 10th (and later the following nights) fair counts may be obtained during the late evenings.

In order to see most nearly the maximum at any hour, one must keep his eyes constantly on the sky. Casual glances skyward may show only a few per hour. A reclining chair in a dark spot is recommended.

Dr. Chas. P. Olivier of the University of Pennsylvania and president of the American Meteor society is again this year asking for volunteers to count the Perseid meteors. All who wish to help with this are asked to send their reports to the present writer at 1832 Longview avenue, Eugene, Oregon. Please state the date, giving hour of beginning and ending the count.
