

Lane 4-H Boys Best At Judging Stock

The Lane county 4-H club boys taking part in the annual club tour at the state college at Corvallis Monday and Tuesday won the livestock judging contest over the delegations from the six other counties, is the word brought back by E. A. Danielson, county club leader, who accompanied them on the tour. The Lane boys received the highest average, thereby giving them the honors in the contest.

Further honors were given Lane county when Melvin Lindley, one of the club members going from here, placed first in the entire group of 115 from the seven counties. Others from Lane county placing in the contest were Gary Vincent and Ashley Flaten, who tied for third place, with a boy from another county; Charles Huffstader and David Shoop, who tied for fifth place, with others; Edwin Cole, Charles Cline and Gary McKenzie, who placed in the sixth group; Clarence Gallagher in the eighth and Delbert Lindley in the ninth. The top ten places took in half of the boys on the tour and all but two of the Lane county boys were in these ten places.

In the plant identification contest, David Shoop was in the seventh place group and Delbert Lindley in the ninth place group. The county delegation placed sixth.

The Lane county boys broadcast a program over KOAC radio station at the college Monday evening, making a very creditable appearance, Danielson said.

Eugene McKenzie, leader of the Coburg livestock club, and Ralph Cline, who took some of the boys to Corvallis, along with Danielson, accompanied the boys and remained the two days.

The 115 club members taking part in the tour were from Lane, Linn, Polk, Douglas, Marion, Benton and Yamhill counties. Those going from Lane were Charles Huffstader of Mohawk, Ashley Flaten of Delight Valley, Gary McKenzie of Coburg, Melvin Lindley, Delbert Linc, Dickey Vandenberg, Edwin Cole, Ralph Cline, Charles Cline, Clarence Gallagher and Gary Vincent, all of Garden Way.

Truck Tire Committee For Oregon Formed

PORTLAND, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Fifty representatives of haulers, farmers, feed dealers, dairymen, contractors and lumbermen organized the Oregon emergency truck tire committee for maintenance of essential transportation, here last night.

E. W. Peck of Portland was elected chairman. He said the committee will urge additional manpower for tire manufacturers and will ask the army if it can release any tires from its stockpile.

Murray Defends Reconversion Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Fighting a republican-southern democratic coalition attempt to shelve the Murray-Kilgore reconversion bill, Sen. Murray (D-Mont.) threatened today to seek repeal of post-war business relief tax concessions if congress denied "adequate protection for the American working man."

Asserting "there are no strings attached" to tax concessions provided for in the "carry-back" and "carry-forward" provisions of the 1942 revenue act, Murray said if business fell off with drastic termination of war contracts corporations might get back "the sum total of all normal taxes paid during the previous two years."

"The government," he declared, "may be called upon to hand out to American corporations \$28,000,000,000."

Murray cautioned in a prepared senate speech against any attempt to substitute for federal standards of post-war unemployment compensation rates up to \$35 a week, as proposed in his bill, a republican-supported measure by Sen. George (D-Ga.) leaving rat fix-

ing to the states.

Murray's speech followed republican protests that his reconversion plan could be used to set a far political machine and came during talk of a possible compromise settlement of the unemployment benefits dispute.

Britain Gets 2 Billion In Lend-Lease Food

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The United States has furnished Britain with about \$2,000,000,000 worth of foodstuffs in the three and a quarter years that lend-lease has been in operation. This is the most important element of civilian supply that will require adjustment when only the war with Japan remains.

A steady curtailment in lend-lease aid to the British isles, paralleled by a return to normal commercial trade, is expected after Germany is defeated.

However, so far as can be learned, no program to that end has been worked out and officials plan to make the curtailment only when they have a real situation to work with.

Wacs Gain Weight; Exercise Ordered

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Army chow, a WAC parade, a general's discerning eye and a survey combined to produce this edict.

VON PAPEN REPORTED HELD
ISTANBUL, Aug. 9.—(AP)—Franz von Papen, former German ambassador to Turkey, was arrested as soon as he entered Germany yesterday on his return from Ankara, an official of an international bank here reported last night. The bank official, a personal friend of von Papen, received no details of the arrest.

OPA Includes List Of Scales, Graders

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—(AP)—The OPA has incorporated in its west coast log price regulation an approved list of scales and graders.

It provides that beginning Aug. 14 buyers and sellers who engage the services of persons on the list will be absolved of responsibility "if it is found upon a resale or a scale of the logs that a variation" of more than 5 per cent exists.

While unapproved scales and graders may be used, buyers and sellers will be held accountable for variations of more than 5 per cent "and will be subject to penalties" provided, OPA said.

The agency also announced that effective the same date hardwood logs will be brought under the west coast log price regulation, covering production in western Washington and western Oregon.

Such logs have been exempt from price control.

Price ceilings for hardwood logs are not established in the regulation but will be provided by OPA on application.

MEATS AND FATS
Red stamps A8 through Z8, and A5, B5, and C5, Book 4, now valid indefinitely.

PROCESSED FOODS
Blue stamps A8 through Z8 and A5 through F5, Book 4, valid indefinitely.

SUGAR
Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32, Book 4, valid indefinitely, 5 lbs. each.
February 28 — Sugar stamp 40, Book 4, valid for five pounds of cane sugar, will expire.

Supplemental canning sugar, maximum 20 pounds per person, may be obtained by applying at the rationing board on form R-223, attaching "SPARE" Stamp 37 from Book 4 for each person applying for.

SHOES
Airplane stamps 1 and 2, Book 3, good indefinitely.

FUEL OIL
Sept. 30—Period 4 and 5 coupons expire at midnight. Period 1 coupons in new fuel oil ration may be used now.

WOOD, SAWDUST, COAL
No matter what kind of fuel you burn, order it NOW! OPA predicts a "tight" situation next winter in all fuel—oil, coal, and wood.

GASOLINE
Sept. 21—No. 12 stamps in A book expire at midnight.

RATION BOARD HOURS
The war price and rationing board is open to the public from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m., on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday; until 9 p. m. on Tuesday; until noon on Saturday. The office is located at 29 Eleventh Avenue west. Telephone 4697.
