Grange Protests Missile Throwing

Boys and girls being transported to and from the bean fields in trucks and other vehicles have been cautioned about throwing articles at passengers in cars or at pedestrians walking along the roads and streets, as a result of a complaint received by **Harry Bower**, farm labor assistant, from **V. J. Vincent**, secretary of the Willakenzie grange.

In a letter to **Bower** from **Vincent** it is stated that this grange, at its meeting Aug. 5, passed a resolution directing the secretary to write to **Bower**, calling attention to these acts. The grange secretary in his letter says:

"Several members spoke of being hit by objects thrown by riders in both large and small trucks. One woman was hit in the back of the shoulder by a prune which raised a large welt. A car driver recently received a dose of water through his car window as he passed a truck. Several drivers have been hit with beans as they passed these trucks. It is the writer's opinion that in case of damages the owner of the truck would be liable, but this is written with the idea of forestalling any such accident by stopping the practice at its source."

Upon receipt of the letter **Bower** immediately replied, assuring the grange organization that immediate action through platoon supervisors will be taken and that the matter will be discussed with all bean growers who load their crews at the farm labor office loading lot. **Bower's** reply to Secretary **Vincent's** letter reads:

"We wish to thank you for your letter of Aug. 9, bringing to our attention certain facts relative to passengers on trucks throwing various articles at pedestrians and car drivers. If such acts are taking place on any of the trucks which are being driven by platoon supervisors, we can take immediate action through the platoon supervisors."

"We will also discuss this matter with all other growers who load their crews at our loading lot and impress upon them their responsibility in eliminating such acts by persons riding on their trucks."

"Many growers who are transporting workers pick up their crews at various places in Eugene and Springfield without coming to the central farm labor loading lot. Therefore, we do not contact such growers in any way."

"May I again thank you for your cooperation, and assure you we will do everything we possibly can, Springfield, has been filed. The business of the company is the distribution of gasoline and oil. Members of the company are **Merritt Truax** and **A. M. Knapp**.

Adults Wanted In Lane Bean Fields

With the near approach of the peak of the bean season in yards around Eugene and Springfield the need for more pickers is being stressed by **Harry Bower**, farm labor assistant.

Younger people are turning out in large numbers to help gather the crop but there appears to be a lack of adult pickers, **Bower** said Friday. He is appealing to the adults to help in this emergency as growers may face a loss if this hot weather continues. The heat is ripening the beans very rapidly and if it continues, the picking season will probably reach its peak next week. All the late yards are now in operation and some of them will face a shortage of pickers unless more people turn out for the work.
