Mass Suicide of Jews In France Reported

LIVERPOOL. (AP)—Jews interned at the Grand hotel of Vittel, France, were reported by British civilian repatriates to have committed mass suicide upon hearing a rumor that the Germans were singling them out for further persecutions.

The British civilians arrived here from Lisbon aboard the exchange ship Droghda. Mrs. Annie Harding said panic broke out among the Jews held at Vittel, 170 miles southeast of Paris, when it was reported that they were being moved elsewhere for more severe treatment.

Many threw themselves from the windows of the Grand hotel, she said, and others poisoned themselves while some even tried to do away with their children.

Susan Lovell said she had seen many German soldiers in patched uniforms in the last few months. "They talked to us freely about the progress of the war going favorably for the allies," she said. "The attacks on Germany have been terrific. I saw a lot of it on the way home. Whole towns have been flattened."

Of the trip from German territory, Mrs. Harding said: "The Germans kept shunting us backward and forward and putting us into trains to allow their own ammunition trains to be rushed up to north France. With allied bombing, the journey became a real nightmare. Once the train was hit by bombs and the engine was smashed to pieces."

Yank Trucks Carry Much Aid To Reds

WASHINGTON. (AP)—American trucks are carrying "a good 50 per cent" of the highway-borne military supplies to the Russian front, the chief of the American military mission in Moscow has reported. Crediting the vehicles with a tremendous part in the surging advance of the red army, Maj. Gen. John R. Deane told a news conference those gains can be explained in full only as a westward advance of the whole Russian people.

To keep the armies rolling, supply lines must be rebuilt, he said, and a tremendous amount of army supply has been kept moving on the railroads. What cannot be moved by rail, however, moves on the highway, and "everything that rolls—from peasant carts to motor trucks"—is used.

The ability of the soviet army to keep such a "polyglot mass" of transportation moving in orderly fashion, Deane commented, is a magnificent tribute to the discipline and organizational ability of the Russian people.

The general, temporarily back in this country after ten months in Russia, said there were four points he wanted to emphasize about the war on the eastern front: "1. The Russians are in the war 100 per cent—you will see in Russia total war if you are ever going to see it."

"2. They have reached a very high degree of military competency."

"3. They are very appreciative of American assistance and are using it up to the hilt."

"4. They like Americans, they want to be friends, and they cooperate with us in every way."

Boy Reports Robbed And Slugged By Thugs

Attacked by thugs, a Eugene boy, Kenneth Brown, 2718 Bell Lane, was slugged at 1 a.m. Friday, near the railway yards, he reported to city police.

Young Brown said he was walking along the road on the east end of the Southern Pacific yards when two men approached and stopped him, to inquire about bus schedules.

Suddenly one of the men seized him, and the other rifled his pockets, taking his billfold containing \$5 in cash and some personal papers, he said. During the brief struggle, he was stunned by a blow on the head, the boy reported.

Last Big Air Fight Over Europe Fought?

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS, AEF, LONDON. (AP)—The allies may have fought their last big air battle over western Europe, Air Chief Marshal Sir Trafford Leigh-Mallory told a supreme headquarters press conference.

The Luftwaffe disappointed the Anglo-American air commander by failing to resist invasion when the Nazi sky-fleet was set and waiting for the Germans. Since then the Nazi air arm has failed to put up a determined resistance and Marshal Leigh-Mallory said he believes it unlikely that they will increase their effort.

"It will be very much surprised if the Luftwaffe stages a comeback—they have gone too far," he said. "They have still got good equipment, as in the last war, but even new equipment is not likely to pull the Luftwaffe out of its tailspin."

Oct. 1 to Speed War Bond Redemption

Notice was issued Friday from the United States treasury that Oct. 1 has been set tentatively as date for commercial banks to begin paying immediate cash for war savings bonds presented for redemption.

The two local banks, Eugene First National and the Eugene branch of the United States National bank of Portland, said they had not received official instructions as yet, but are expecting the set-up the same as all other banks of the country. The banks have redeemed war bonds right along, but the new set-up expedites and speeds up the procedure, it is stated.

Air Raid Warning System Revamped

SALEM, Aug. 11. (AP)—County defense coordinators of western Oregon met here yesterday with state defense administrator Jack Hays to make changes in the air raid warning system.

Hays said the changes were extensive, but they could not be disclosed.
