Annual Report For Library Submitted

COTTAGE GROVE—Mrs. Nellie M. Hamant, librarian, has submitted the annual Cottage Grove public library statistical report as of June 30, 1944. Trustees of the library are Mrs. Ethel M. Macklin, president; Mrs. Margaret Ferrin, vice president; Miss Lulu Curran, secretary treasurer; and other members, Mrs. Dutee Woodard, and H. E. Eakin. During the year a gift of a building site on the corner of South Sixth and Adams, was presented by W. A. Woodard Lumber company, and a large number of books was presented the library by S. K. Landess and Joe Landess.

The number of borrowers registered at the beginning of the year was 1633 and the number of new ones registered during the year 279, making a total of 1912. There were 240 registrations withdrawn, leaving 1672 borrowers at the end of the year. The per cent of population registered as borrowers is 55.7.

The number of volumes in the book stock at the beginning of the year was 4262. There were 1060 books purchased, 70 added by gifts, 125 volumes lost or withdrawn, leaving a total of 5267 books in stock at the end of the year. There were 16 books borrowed from the state library. Fifteen periodicals are received by subscription and six from gifts.

The number of volumes of fiction loaned for home use included: to adults 8510, and children 1940, a total of 10,450 fiction in circulation during the year. There were 1304 adult non-fiction and 584 children non-fiction, making 1888 non-fiction used. The number of unbound magazines loaned during the year was 218. The total circulation for home use was 12,557, an increase of 357 over the preceding year.

During the year the receipts from the rental book were \$107.10 and from fines, lost books and reserves, \$103.90. There were \$1867.49 spent for new books and \$32.75 for periodicals, and about \$100 spent for a new filing cabinet.
