

# Bud Brewer Pitches Cascade All-Stars To 6-0 Shutout Over Giustina Reds

## Night Game Set For Wednesday

### Simpson Leads 10-Hit Attack Off Hayes

The Cascade All-Stars left no doubt in any fan's mind as to their baseball prowess as they walloped the champion Giustina Reds 6-0 in the first of a three-game series at Civic Stadium. Sunday's inaugural contest drew a crowd of only 850 paid admissions, to a game that was one of the best played of the season. The second game will be Wednesday night, starting at 8:30, and a third game, regardless of the outcome Wednesday, will be staged next Sunday afternoon.

Cocky Brewer, Miller Lumber hurler, was in fine form as he limited the Reds to six—three of them scratch—while his mates were finding Archie Hayes for ten heavy blows. Despite the handicap of never playing together before as a unit, the Twinks played errorless ball, and a certain Mr. Dutch White, who performed in the capacity of custodian of the left field, robbed more than one Red of a bingle.

After the second inning, when the All-Stars scored three runs there was never much doubt as to the winner. Giustina only threatened once—in the sixth when they filled the bags. But some neat defensive ball by the All-Stars cut off any possible runs.

Stars Hit Hayes Hard  
Jack Walton started out the big second inning with his double that "fried" the air when it burned down the third-base line. Chet Simpson, right fielder then blooped one over first. Walton scoring from second. Shortstop Ranny Smith fanned, and the next man, Grov Kelsay, singled to send Simpson to third. Elbert Dixon was then safe on second-sacker Burt Avery's error. Simpson crossing the dish and Kelsay going to third. Kelsay came home when Giustina's catcher, Ralph Mohler, threw to second to cut off Dixon's steal, but all hands were safe and accounted for. Brewer struckout to retire the side.

The Stars added another in the fourth. Simpson collected his second hit of the game over second, and stole to the keystone sack. Kelsay then sent a "nothing pitch" burning down the right field line that was scored as a triple, as the ball took one "helluva" hop and rolled somewhere in the vicinity of 23rd and Willamette.

And then the Star punched two more across in the fifth. Del Hoff laid down a wonderful bunt towards third to get on, and went to third on Dutch White's double. Hoff scored when Walton grounded out, and Simpson, who was the big gun in the Star's offensive game batted home White with his single.

Giustina threatened seriously in the sixth. Hayes opened the inning with an infield fly that went untouched for a hit, and went down to second as Carl Stevenson hit to left field. Johnny Dunn advanced the runners with his hit to center. But Elbert Dixon at first cut Hayes off at home with his fine throw of Bob Caviness' ground ball. Avery fanned and Elvan Pitney fled out to end the threat.

Howard Robertson, former Giustina player who is now a captain in the army air corps and who is home on leave from the European war theater, played in center field for the Reds, and was their big boy at the platter. He hit "two for four."

Outstanding batter for the day, however, was Simpson with three hits in four trips, also having two runs batted in to his credit. Grov Kelsay, Star third baseman had "two for two," and Dutch White "two for four."

During a pre-game ceremony, Judge Charles A. Wintermeier, Eugene's No. 1 baseball fan and a former ace pitcher, presented the Babb Hardware championship trophy to Manager Ed Brauner and his Giustina Reds.

## Herb Parks Scores Mat Win Over Tony Morelli

Herb Parks was the wrestling winner by default in the main event at the Pearl Street arena Saturday night as Tony Morelli injured his hand in the second fall on a windup that connected unexpectedly with Parks' head instead of his jaw.

Parks and Morelli lost no time in getting down to business. The first 10 minutes of the match was practically a straight series of strangle holds applied on Parks by Morelli. Morelli took the first fall in 10 minutes.

Parks came back to the ring to vindicate himself in eight minutes of fast action—forcing Morelli on the ropes several times and out of the ring once, at which time Morelli was hit in the back with a coke bottle thrown by one of the spectators. The person involved in the unlawful act was caught and as of last night it was undecided as to whether or not he would be prosecuted. Morelli came back into the ring and tossed the haymaker that connected with Parks' head. Parks retaliated with a leg stomp that took the fall in eight minutes.

Morelli showed great determination by returning to the ring for the third fall. Parks displayed sportsmanship by not wanting to continue the match with Morelli's hand in the condition it was. Referee Elton Owen eventually awarded the match to Parks.

Morelli's injury is not serious but was painful. The ligaments of his hand were sprained.

The semi-final between Pat O'Dowdy and Ivan Jones ran a full 30 minutes to a draw, with each man taking a fall.

Jones took the first fall in 10 minutes with an airplane spin and body press that left O'Dowdy definitely shaken.

O'Dowdy returned to the ring to take the second fall in a hard, rough and tumble fall that really gave the crowd their money's worth. After a terrific struggle and a lot of work on Jones' left leg, O'Dowdy took the fall in 15 minutes with a full Boston crab.

Jack Lipscomb and Ernie Piluso were the openers but, the bout only lasted for 12 minutes of fast and hard wrestling that had the crowd screaming for the largest share of the time.

Lipscomb took the first fall in five minutes with a series of body blows and a body press. Piluso came back to the ring to take the second fall in two minutes with a series of headlocks that took only two minutes to bring Lipscomb to his knees. The third fall was awarded to Piluso on fouls, in five minutes. The decision was contested by Lipscomb in his best manner of tangling with the referee and Owen did some good fancy footwork and wrestling himself until the ring was finally cleared.

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Two Seattle baseball players were taken to a hospital with knife wounds early today after they told police that they were cut by two assailants on a downtown street corner.

Radio patrol officers J. M. Doctors and R. E. Brown reported that William Derflinger, 24, center-fielder, and Gene Holt, 23, south-paw pitcher, said two Negroes approached them as they were laughing and talking. The ball players said the Negroes made some remark, slashed them with knives and fled.

Holt was treated for a four-inch laceration of his left arm and Derflinger for a similar wound on his left arm. They received other small cuts and Derflinger incurred a leg wound.

## Browns Retain League Lead

NEW YORK, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The American league was in a state of agitation today regarding the St. Louis Browns and their 6½ game lead in the league race but, oddly enough, nobody seemed to be able to do anything about it.

The Browns, circuit doormats for so long that they established squatters' rights on the cellar, began their current eastern trip with a 6½-game lead and the margin hasn't varied a bit in six games already played. Without benefit of higher mathematics it's obvious that a continuation of that lead will result in the first American league pennant in history for the St. Louis club.

Doerr's Homer Wins For Sox  
Sunday's opener in Boston was a game expected of two top clubs. It was decided in the 13th inning on Bobby Doerr's 15th homer which gave Boston a 7-6 edge. Rookie Rex Cecil, recently purchased from the San Diego club of the Pacific coast league, arrived in town shortly before game time and pitched the last four innings to gain the decision in his first major league game. The second game was called at the end of five innings because of Massachusetts' Sunday law and the Browns gained a 6-1 triumph.

Chicago and New York shared at Yankee Stadium in a pair of lopsided ball games. Rookie Mel Queen crowned the Sox with a five-hitter in the opener to win his first major league game 10-1. Another rookie, Russ Berry, hit a grand-slam homer for the champions to give Queen more than enough lead. Orval Grove pitched the Sox to an 11-1 win in the finale to thwart Hank Borowy's bid for his 15th win.

The Philadelphia Athletics halted the winning streak of the Detroit Tigers at nine games by beating them 6-1 in the first of their two games at Shibe Park. Don Black's three-hitter proved too tough for the Bengals and deprived Hal Newhouser of his 19th win. Dizzy Trout however, became the first major leaguer to record 19 decisions in the nightcap when he pitched the Tigers to a 6-0 shutout.

Dodgers In Cellar Again  
Washington's Senators snapped out of their five-game losing streak, taking both ends of a twin bill from the Cleveland Indians in the capitol, 2-1 and 4-1.

The National league had a feast or famine day with all clubs either winning or losing two. The leading St. Louis Cards provided home fans with a double win over the Brooklyn Dodgers that slid the "Bums" back into the senior circuit basement. Max Lanier pitched a six-hitter for a 4-1 win in the opener. Harry Brecheen won the nightcap for the Red Birds, 7-3, when he received 12-hit support from his mates.

The Philadelphia Phillies came out of the cellar with 3-2 and 7-6 triumphs over the Chicago Cubs at Chicago.

The Cincinnati Reds bested the New York Giants, 4-3 and 9-2 before a home crowd. Clyde Shoun assisted in winning his own game in the first when he singled to drive in a run in the Reds' three-run second inning. George Hausmann, New York second-baseman, made three successive errors in the fourth inning of the nightcap, which, with the aid of a single hit, led to four runs and more than enough margin for Jim Konstanty.

Rip Sewell pitched five-hit ball and clouted a home run to lead the Pittsburgh Pirates to an 8-1 victory in their opener against Boston. Frank Colman's two-run homer in the eighth inning of the second game supplied Fritz Ostermueller with the margin of triumph in a 3-1 game.

Today and tomorrow's 18-hole rounds over Manito course will be medal play and will whittle the field to 32 who will begin match play on Wednesday for the \$20,000 prize money offered by the Spokane Athletic Round Table.

Favored to be around for the finals and quoted at 3-1 in the betting were Byron Nelson of Toledo, O., and Harold "Jug" McSpaden of Philadelphia, top money winners of the year, thus far. Second choice and bracketed at 4-1 were Craig Wood of Mammoth, N. Y., and Sammy Byrd of Detroit.

Ted Longworth of the Waverly Country Club in Portland stole the show during practice rounds by scoring an ace on the 159-yard No. 3 hole. Using a No. 4 iron, Longworth hit the well-trapped green 18 inches beyond the hole and the backspin pulled the ball back into the cup. He finished the round with a one-under-par 71.

The final round of 36 holes was scheduled for next Sunday.

A gallery of several hundred braved intermittent showers yesterday to watch two four-somes, which included most of the "name" players except Nelson and McSpaden, for a final practice round over the tricky, par-72 layout.
