"It was practically love at first sight, and we were married three weeks later," she related.
"I was afraid to come to America. Oh, the things the Australian papers said about how you would treat us over here! But everyone has been simply wonderful!"
She said she enjoyed California scenery, but she preferred her trip through Oregon.
"The mountain streams amongst all that pine are wonderful," she said. "I can hardly wait until I get to La Grande, and I want to see the Pendleton round-up. We have those in Australia but we call them rodeos. And there are no Indians."

No Special Session,
Gov. Snell Repeats
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 16.—(AP)—No special session of the Oregon legislature will be called to change the soldier voting law, Gov. Earl Snell said today, following his receipt of petitions bearing more than 25,000 signatures asking for such a session.
He had previously announced no special session would be called.
The governor said he attached no political significance to the petitions, which were brought here by the Multnomah county chairman of the democratic party.
"It is a case largely of misunderstanding and lack of information," the governor stated, adding that he had definitely decided no special session was necessary after meeting with the secretary of state and county clerks of 33 Oregon counties, and going into details of the present plan.

Liquor Sales Curfew
Fox Soldiers Stressed
FORT DOUGLAS, Utah, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Liquor establishments in the eight western states will continue to be requested not to make sales to army personnel after 8 p. m. daily, despite a relaxation for some naval personnel, ninth service command headquarters said today.
The army has asked that sales to military personnel be made only between the hours of 5 and 8 p. m.
State liquor dispensary officials in Idaho said they had been notified by the 13th naval district that they could sell to naval personnel any time during regular store hours.
The 13th naval district includes Oregon, Washington and Idaho, states which, with five others, make up the army's ninth service command.

Klamath Expecting
Record Potato Crop
KLAMATH FALLS, Aug. 16.—(AP)—Three weeks more without frost will give the Klamath basin the biggest potato crop in its history, with a volume equaling one-third of the entire production of the potato state of Idaho, it was estimated here by County Agent C. A. Henderson.
Henderson said the basin crop is growing on 25,500 acres, and will total between 12,000 and 13,000 carloads if it escapes frost for another three weeks.

William C. Bullitt
Joins French Army
ALGERS, Aug. 16.—(AP)—William C. Bullitt, 53, former American ambassador to France, Tuesday joined the French army as a commandant, equivalent to the rank of major in the U. S. army, the French information ministry announced today.
Bullitt, an honorary citizen of a number of French towns, established that he could retain American citizenship and serve in the French army.
Bullitt said his offer of active military duty had been rejected twice by U. S. Secretary of War Stimson because of his age.
