4 1/2 Cups Sugar  
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice  
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash 3 quarts of fully ripe berries. Crush thoroughly and squeeze out the juice. Measure exactly 3 1/2 cups of the juice (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well, bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 2 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, skim. Pour into sterilized glasses, allowing 1/2-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.

## Big Bombers 'Pressurized' For Altitude

SEATTLE, Aug. 17.—High-flying crews of American Superfortresses, of the type which recently raided the Japanese homeland and oil fields in Sumatra, ride in three pressure sections in the plane's nose, center section and tail, Boeing Aircraft company officials announced today, in a statement approved by the war department.

Fact that the Superforts were pressurized within to dispense almost completely with need for oxygen masks on long-distance, high-altitude flights was announced soon after the huge bombers carried out their first raid on Japan, June 15. Details of the internal construction however, had remained on the secret list.

Two of the pressure sections, Boeing said, the pilot's control cabin in the nose and the gunner's compartment amidships, are connected by a tube-like tunnel, running down the fuselage over the big bomb bays. The tunnel is large enough to crawl through. The tail gunner, however, is sealed off from his team-mates by an unpressurized section in the rear fuselage.

Question of pressurizing cabins of long-distance bombers for high altitude flights, Boeing said, was first discussed with them by the army in 1938, shortly after the company had developed its commercial stratoliner.

After experiments with Flying Fortresses, Boeing announced that model could not successfully be adapted to pressure cabins. Further discussions, however, led in 1939 to submission of bids on a new type, heavy bomber, and the company submitted plans for the B-29 incorporating a pressure cabin. Boeing was given the go-ahead on construction 20 days after Hitler invaded the low countries, the statement recalled.

Describing the interior of the Superforts, Boeing said the fuselage had been shaped cylindrically to withstand pressure from inside and out. Curved internal bulkheads were installed for the same reason between pressurized and unpressurized sections of the plane. Rivets and ducts for control wires were carefully sealed against leakage. Synthetic rubber bushings were used to seal control channels through bulkheads. Doors of the big Superforts were hinged to swing inward, Boeing said, to prevent cabin pressure from blowing them open at high altitude.

Inside the huge bombers, cabin pressure is regulated automatically, so that supercharged air is pumped into the plane to build up pressure as the aircraft climbs, and is released when it descends.

The huge bomb bays of the Superforts were left unpressurized for obvious reasons, Boeing stated.

Explaining procedure during action, Boeing said that once the long-range bombers reached their target the cabins were depressurized.

This served, the company said, as a precautionary measure in case enemy anti-aircraft fire punctured the hermetically sealed parts of the fuselage, suddenly releasing the air inside.

Tests showed, Boeing said, that crewmen suffered no ill effects from such incidents, other than to be distracted from their work.
