Tiffanys Buy Sole Ownership Of Store

Sale of her interest in the Tiffany-Davis drug store to Mr. and Mrs. Albert R. Tiffany is announced by Mrs. Kora Davis Heltterline, and papers for dissolution of the corporation have been filed at Salem. Mr. and Mrs. Tiffany will continue the business as sole owners.

The Tiffany-Davis Drug company, Inc., was organized Oct. 24, 1925, by Albert R. Tiffany and Mrs. Heltterline's first husband, the late George W. Davis, with the following officers: Tiffany as president, Davis as vice-president, Mrs. Heltterline as secretary-treasurer. Mrs. Frances Tiffany as stockholder.

At the start of business on Willamette street between Eighth and Broadway, there were small quarters (12 foot frontage) and a sales staff of two.

When the former McMorran and Washburne store moved from Eighth and Willamette to its new building at Broadway and Willamette, Tiffany bought the building at Eighth and Willamette, now known as the Tiffany building, and the drug concern in which he was associated with Davis opened there in 1935. Today, the concern, including the fountain, employs 25 persons.

Upon the death of Davis on Feb. 26, 1939, Tiffany took over as manager. Mrs. Heltterline then becoming active in the business as vice-president. Mrs. Tiffany as secretary-treasurer. At the time of the sale of the Davis interest, Tiffany was president of the concern; Mrs. Heltterline, vice-president; Mrs. Tiffany, secretary-treasurer; Dr. L. G. Heltterline, Geraldine Davis, stockholders.

Ground Chief Sends 100th Mission Out

13TH AAF, S. W. PACIFIC—More than 100 times, Master Sergeant Rex McKy of Eugene has watched the 13th AAF Liberators in his charge take off from jungle landing strips.

And more than 100 times, at the end of the day, McKy has waited at the strip, "sweating out" the arrival of the planes.

Sometimes they did not return. Many times they came back punctured by machine gun bullets and flak, with wounded or dying aboard. McKy and his crews were always on hand, no matter what hour the bombers descended, to repair the damage of the day's raid on Jap territory and make the lumbering, powerful aircraft ready for the next day's strike.

Sergeant McKy's ground flight chief, marked his 100th mission recently a short time after he concluded two years of overseas service. His present charges are five deadly, hard-fighting Liberators that have completed more than 60 missions over Yap, Truk, and the great central Pacific bases on the 13th AAF's daily time-table of destruction.

The air war in the Pacific is one-sided now and McKy does his work with little fear of Jap raids. On Guadalcanal, though, the workday or night, frequently was interrupted by the wall of the air raid siren. Huddled in foxholes McKy and his crews waited until the 13th's fighters drove off the intruders and work on the bombers could proceed.

A graduate of the AAF mechanic's school, Chanute field, Ill., Sergeant McKy began his overseas service in April, 1942 after joining the army in October, 1941. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ted McKy of Crow stage route, Eugene, and was graduated from Eugene high school.

McKy has been awarded three battle stars in recognition of the part he played in the three major campaigns of the 13th AAF in the south, southwest and central Pacific theaters.

Raver Charges Attempt To Control Power

PORTLAND, Aug. 18 — (AP)—Bonneville Power Administrator Paul J. Raver today answered Pacific Power and Light company President Paul B. McKee's criticisms of Bonneville administration with the charge that McKee was attempting to gain control over the northwest's rich power supply "for the benefit of his New York stockholders instead of the power users."

In answer to McKee's statement that cost of electricity in Pacific northwest homes will be lowered repeatedly if "business-managed power systems are kept in the picture to give the public power bureaucrats healthy competition," Raver said that "As usual Mr. McKee has put the cart before the horse."

"Efficiently-managed public agencies all over this region are giving private power bureaucrats some healthy competition for the first time in their history," he said.

H. J. Smith Heads S. P. Stores Department

Harold J. Smith, who has held various store department positions for Southern Pacific during the past 35 years, has been promoted to head that department as general storekeeper with headquarters in San Francisco, effective Sept. 1, according to announcement by J. W. Corbett, general manager of the railroad. Smith will succeed A. S. McKelligon, who is retiring at his own request after 47 years of railroad service, having been general storekeeper for the past 26 years. Starting with Southern Pacific in Texas in 1897, McKelligon held store positions at Tucson, Portland, Oakland, Sacramento and San Francisco.

Coming to the railroad as a clerk at West Oakland stores in 1909, Smith advanced through positions at Dunsmuir, Portland, San Francisco, El Paso, and since 1941 has been assistant general storekeeper at Sacramento. He will be succeeded there by S. L. Bouque, assistant to general storekeeper at San Francisco, who has been with Southern Pacific since 1912.

Government To Buy Dried Fruit Output

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Total production of dried peaches, pears, prunes, raisins, currants, apricots and apples this year will be purchased by the government, the war food administration has announced.

Packers will continue to set aside their entire output under provisions similar to the ones in effect last year. Any part of the 1944-45 pack not needed for war needs will be released to civilians, the WFA said.

The WFA also announced a program of equalization payments for canners outside the Bartlett-pear producing area of the northwest who will help process the surplus of pears expected this season in that area.

WFA said the program is to encourage maximum production of canned pears in order to meet civilian requirements. To qualify, processors must pay the announced producer price, averaging \$73 a ton in Washington and Oregon, and sell the canned pears at the ceiling price for their area.

The WFA then will refund what amounts to a transportation subsidy to canners participating in the program. Payments will be made only to canners who submit bids which are accepted by WFA.

Insurance Agents Elect Medford Man

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—(AP)—V. J. Robinson, Medford, is new president of the Oregon Association of Insurance Agents.

Robert S. Farrell Jr., secretary of state, told the agents' convention yesterday that the Oregon law requiring certain motorists to be insured had proved satisfactory in assuring financial responsibility of drivers. He added, however, that minor changes would be asked at the next legislature.

Elmer W. Jordan of 995 Seventh avenue west, died suddenly Tuesday in California, while on a visit to his son, Chaplain Galin Jordan, near San Luis Obispo, Calif. Mr. Jordan was born Nov. 2, 1875, six miles northwest of Elmira. He spent more than 40 years as a teacher in rural schools of Lane county, and had been a member of the Christian church for more than 55 years.

He is survived by his son, Chaplain Jordan, and Mrs. Nettie Lane of route 2, Eugene; one granddaughter, Patsy Jordan. His wife died some years ago.

Funeral services will be held Monday at the Elmira Christian church, with interment in Inman cemetery, the Branstetter-Simon mortuary in charge.
