Teaching Staff At Grove Is Announced

COTTAGE GROVE.—The entire staff of teachers for Cottage Grove public schools, with the exception of the band and orchestra instructor, is completed by the election of the last four teachers at board meetings held this week.

There will be five new teachers at the Cottage Grove union high school, four at the Jefferson grade school, and five at the Adams school, besides a vocal music supervisor for both grades and high school.

Among the new instructors on the union high school staff is Lewett C. Hart, of McGill, Nevada, who will take Leroy Beghtol's place as industrial arts teacher. Beghtol recently resigned to accept a position in Portland. Hart is a graduate of the Arizona State Teachers college and has nearly completed work for a master's degree. He has taught for eleven years and during the past two years has been shop teacher at Tonopah high school in Nevada. He plans to arrive with his family by Sept. 1.

Miss Dorothea Smith, of Newberg, a recent graduate of Oregon State college, will be head of the Smith-Hughes home economics department, filling the vacancy left by the resignation of Miss Comery Coleman. Miss Coleman goes to Philomath to teach in connection with the O. S. C. cadet instruction program. The new supervisor here, Miss Smith, was a campus leader while at Oregon State college, and made an outstanding record in home economics. She is visiting in Cottage Grove this week.

William W. Pyle, who has a master's degree from the Indiana State Teachers' college, will be instructor of commercial subjects and United States history. For the past three years he has been connected with the Rockport high school, Rockport, Ind., and the past year has served as principal. Mr. and Mrs. Pyle and young son expect to arrive in Cottage Grove within two weeks.

For high school sciences, including biology, general science, and physics, the school board has elected Arthur Mason, a graduate of the University of Oregon, and recently employed by the Klamath Falls union high school. He has had graduate work at the University of Washington. Before going to Klamath Falls, Mason served for several years as principal of Elmira high school in this county. He and his family expect to move here early in September.

As music teacher and supervisor for both grades and high school, Miss Virginia Beckman, of Klamath Falls, has been selected. Miss Beckman is a graduate of the Wayne State Teachers college, Nebraska, and has taken advance work at the University of Minnesota. She was music supervisor at Yreka, Calif., last year and previously taught at Anoka, Minn.

At the Jefferson grade school, Miss Ruth M. Lampkin, of North Powder, Ore., will be the seventh and eighth grade home room teacher and librarian, taking the place of Miss Allene Inlow, who will teach at Roseburg next year. Miss Lampkin is a graduate of the Oregon College of Education, and has taken work at Oregon State college and the Eastern Oregon College of Education. She has taught the past two years at Payette, Idaho. The sixth grade home room and girls' physical education teacher will be Miss Gloria L. Gebers of Grants Pass, who recently graduated from the three year course at the Oregon College of Education, specializing in intermediate grade and physical education work.

Of the teachers of special subjects, Miss Lottie L. Lamb, graduate of Oregon College of Education and the University of Oregon, will teach sciences and arithmetic, and have charge of the school library. She has taught for several years in Oregon and the past two years has been at Topaz, Utah. Miss Eleanor L. Scott has been elected for the arts and crafts work with English in 6th grade room. She is a graduate of the University of Oregon, with a major in art and education. She has completed the five year course.

Among the five new teachers at the Adams building, Miss Marie Carstensen will teach one of the fourth grade sections. She is a graduate of the Wayne State Teachers college, Nebraska, and last year taught at Buckley, Wash. She has taken special training in music and English. Mrs. Tamzon Petty, graduate of the Emporia State Teachers college, Kansas, and Mrs. Margaret Conrad, a graduate of Eastern Oregon College of Education, will be in charge of the two third grade rooms. Mrs. Petty has been teaching at Provo, South Dakota, and Mrs. Conrad at Enterprise, Ore. As new primary teachers, Miss Theresa Gehmert, of Ontario, Ore., will be assigned a second grade and Mrs. Gladys V. Goben, of Philomath, Ore., a first grade. Miss Gehmert is a graduate of the Eastern Oregon College of Education and has taught at Hood River and Ontario. Mrs. Goben has a diploma from the Oregon College of Education and has taught primary grades for the past nine years at Philomath.

History on Hadleys
"Charles" Hadley is the son of H. G. Hadley who came to Oregon from Illinois in 1851 by ox team. Charles was born at Spencer Creek in 1854 and later moved with his parents to Hadleyville when a young boy. He was postmaster for a time at Hadleyville, then operated a blacksmith's shop, then he and a nephew ran a sawmill until it burned down. He moved to Eugene where he went into the cigar business with T. C. Luckey, then later took over the cigar store in the St. Charles hotel for a year. He also operated a harness shop for a time in Eugene and did leather tooling. His father owned some fine trotting horses and Charles tells of the time when he was fined \$5 by Ben Doris, city recorder, for driving faster than four miles an hour down the main street of Eugene.

As a young man Charles made quite a reputation as a "bronco buster" and rode for his father and uncle who had a cattle ranch in eastern Oregon. He tells of one trip when a dozen riders took 1400 head of cattle up the McKenzie over the pass to eastern Oregon ranges without losing a single head.

In 1920 Charles and his family moved to Blue River where he and Mrs. Hadley have lived ever since. Charles is very active, is in good health and only wears glasses for reading. He is a life long member of the Elks lodge.

Mrs. Hadley is the former Mary Withers, daughter of Pete Withers, early pioneer of Lane county. Mr. and Mrs. Hadley celebrated their sixty-second wedding anniversary last February. They have two daughters, Mrs. Winifred Kuykendall, of San Diego and Mrs. Earl Parker of Florence and several grandchildren, three of whom are serving in the armed forces.

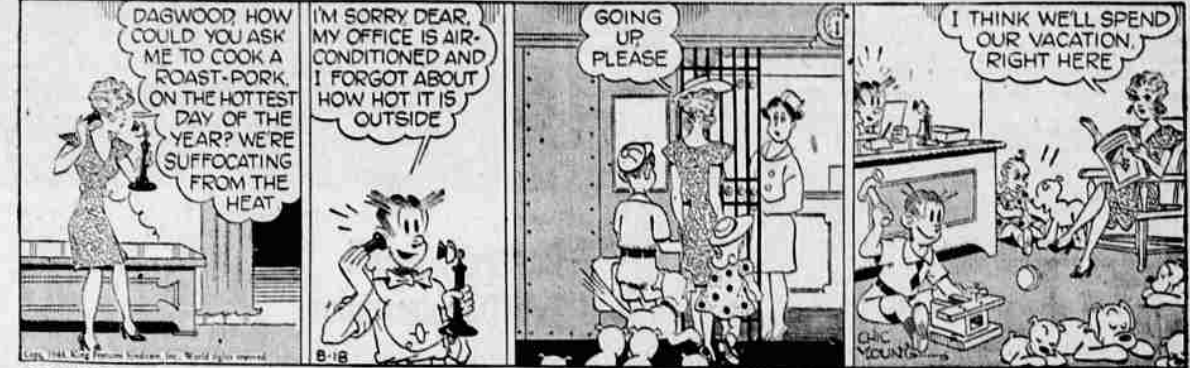

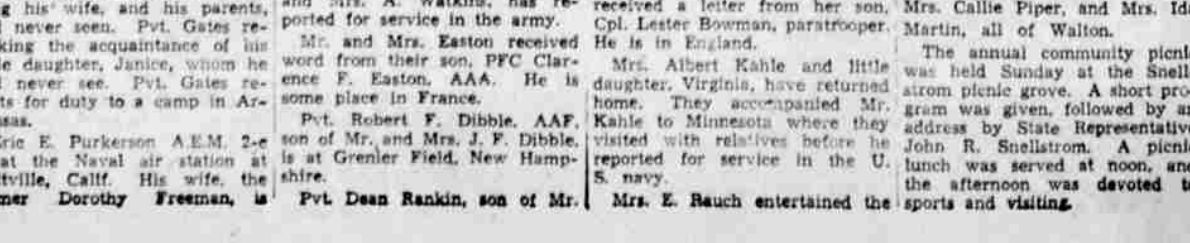
