

Ferguson Women Aid In Drive For Paper

FERGUSON.—The P. U. L. L. club of Ferguson is collecting waste paper in the Pioneer, Union, Laurel Home and Liberty districts as part of the government's nation-wide waste-paper salvage program.

Members of the community may leave their bundles of waste paper, cardboard, cardboard boxes, old newspapers and magazines on the clubhouse porch, with their names on the bundles so that they may receive credit for their contributions.

A truck will collect the waste paper of those who cannot leave it at the clubhouse. If a card is sent to Mrs. Fay Moffett, Rt. 1, Junction City, or if any other member of the club is contacted.

The government has asked that bundles be prepared in a certain manner, but club members will tie and pack the contributions according to specifications for anyone who cannot do so.

To date Mrs. Pearl Wylie of Bear Creek heads the list of contributors, with 144 pounds of her credit, which is enough waste paper to provide boxes for 1858 20 mm. shells.

Neighbors are urged to make their contributions as soon as possible.

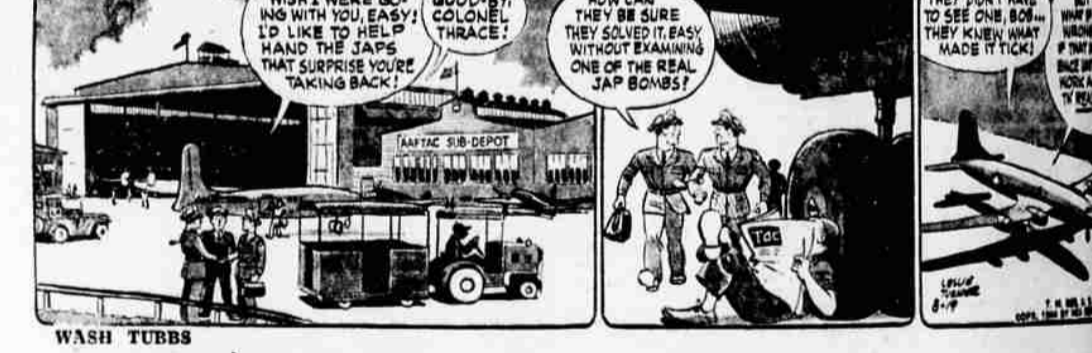
