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"I'm glad I got Lona; she is so lovable and friendly, and smart." Asked why he chose journalism at the university, Harris explained that besides the required 45 hours in the major, he could select other subjects from a wide background, particularly in history, which he likes. His subjects in journalism included elementary newswriting, reporting, editing, and law of the press. He took all the European history courses available—Modern Europe, Recent Balkans, Recent Russia—and in addition, Far East in Modern Times. He has had courses also in sociology, economics, and psychology. When he finishes his third term's editing thesis in "The Future of the Merchant Marine," he will have completed all requirements for a

bachelor of science degree in journalism.

Versatile

The blind journalist takes notes by the Braille method and listens carefully to class lectures. Since few books are published in Braille, he must depend to a great extent on readers. He types and is typing his own thesis. Before coming to the university, he attended high school at the State School for the Blind at Salem and previously had attended a school at Gale, N. D. While at Salem, he took part in the school wrestling matches in competition against students from the Salem high school. He reached the semifinals several times. At the university there were no wrestling matches, but he did wrestle in the gymnasium occasionally.

He likes music, particularly "good solid swing" as rendered by Benny Goodman, and "Blues" although any kind of music is pleasing to him. He also enjoys the radio news analysts and commentators, especially Raymond Gram Swing. His favorite straight news program is the Goodrich broadcast. He would like to get into radio work so that he could utilize his news training. Harris is very good at recogniz-
