Polio Wanes in 3 West Coast States

Outbreaks of infantile paralysis in Oregon, Washington and California are on the decline, according to a report sent out by the national foundation for infantile paralysis.
While Lane county had many cases of the malady last year and the fore part of this year, only two have been reported here in the past two months, records at the office of the Lane county health department show.
More cases were reported throughout the nation during the first 31 weeks of 1944 than in any comparable period since 1916, the foundation's report says.
U. S. public health service reports show 3,992 cases through August 5, the foundation said, 1,226 more than for the same period last year and 1,089 cases more than during the country's second worst outbreak in 1931. In 1916, 6,767 cases were recorded by Aug. 1.
Incidence of the disease is of epidemic or near epidemic proportions in five eastern states, the foundation said, as contrasted with last year's outbreaks which were heaviest west of the Mississippi. Emergency aid has been sent by the foundation to those five states — New York, North Carolina, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, and Virginia — and to eight others: Ohio, Tennessee, Michigan, Mississippi, Indiana, Washington, Oregon, and California. Outbreaks in the last three states have now waned it was said.

Coast Fork Farmers Ask Clear Channel

Thirty-three land owners along the Coast Fork river east of Goshen have petitioned the U. S. army engineers, with headquarters in Eugene, for the removal of obstructions in the channel of the stream.
These farmers and other owners represent a total of 1700 acres in the bottom adjoining the river. Petitioners say they fear high flood water will cause heavy loss of this valuable land.
Army engineers recently built revetments along the banks of the Coast Fork in that area but the land owners want channel clearance also. They declare that their flood problem is not solved until the river is cleared up. In former years the farmers themselves have paid for much flood control work in an effort to control this river.
