Rockefeller Pressure Charged In National Monument Case

SHERIDAN, Wyo.—(P)—Wyo-
ming's soldier-attorney argued in
federal court Monday that the dis-
puted Jackson Hole national mon-
ument was created because John
D. Rockefeller Jr. threatened to
withdraw a gift of land to the
national park service unless the
Grand Teton national park were
enlarged.

The counsel, Cpl. John J. Mc-
Intyre, a former Wyoming con-
gressman and a deputy state at-
torney general until he entered
the army early this year, asserted
at the beginning of the trial in
the state's suit to test validity of
a presidential proclamation creat-
ing the 221,610-acre monument
that Rockefeller wrote Secretary
of Interior Harold Ickes that he
would withdraw his offer of land
if an extension of Grand Teton
national park, including 30,000
acres of Rockefeller land, was not
accomplished.

The proclamation creating the
monument in March, 1943, "was
issued really for the purpose of
extending the Grand Teton na-
tional park rather than protecting
monument objects," McIntyre de-
clared. The Grand Teton park
adjoins Jackson Hole on the west.

McIntyre said two efforts to have
congress extend the boundaries of
the Grand Teton park failed.

The state counsel said he intend-
ed to show in the trial that "the
presidential proclamation was in-
sufficient on its face," and that
the president "acted outside his
authority" under the antiquities
act of 1906 because there are "no
objects of monumental nature" in
the monument.

Ralph S. Boyd of Washington,
department of justice attorney,
said in the government's statement
that the questions involved are

whether the presidential proclama-
tion was proper under the anti-
quities act and whether Paul R.
Frank, superintendent of Grand
Teton park, had done or threaten-
ed to do anything detrimental to
the rights of the state in the ad-
ministration of the monument.

He insisted that the government
would show that Frank had done
nothing detrimental, and that the
area involved is of interest to
biologists, geologists and other
scientists.

Frank, called by McIntyre as
the first state witness, testified
that rangers had been assigned to
the monument for the purpose of
fire protection and to report any
violations of government codes,
such as destruction of government
property.

Boys Offer to Give \$20 Bills to Pedestrians

KLAMATH FALLS—(P)—Three
small boys, from 7 to 9 years of
age, caused a sensation here Sat-
urday night when they started
offering \$20 bills to people on the
streets.

"We've got plenty of money"
they said. "Have some."

An investigation started when a
woman reported to police she had
seen the boys in an alley dividing
up a large sum of money. Police
questioned the boys, who said they
had found the money in a tobacco
pouch and after spending part of
it had given the remainder to a
16-year-old acquaintance. He, in
turn, had handed it to his brother-
in-law, who was questioned by of-
ficers.

Police said the money had been
lost by E. E. Hufford. He told
them the tobacco pouch contained
\$850. When recovered it contained
\$802.
