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STUFFED SHOULDER OF LAMB

Shoulder of lamb
1 cup chopped celery
2 cups soft bread crumbs
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon thyme or marjoram
1/2 medium-sized onion, minced
4 slices bacon, crumbled (optional)
1/2 cup bacon (or meat) drippings
1/4 teaspoon pepper

Have bone removed from shoulder of lamb. Toss together remaining ingredients and stuff pocket full. Fasten edges with skewers or sew in place. Set meat fat side up on rack in an open pan. Cook in slow oven (325° F.) allowing about 35 minutes per pound. Garnish with fresh mint or mint jelly and a vegetable; or with parsley buttered potatoes and currant jelly.
