

Broader European Advisory Unit Urged

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Extending the European advisory commission and broadening its power is being advocated by American officials. It was learned today, as the best way to bridge the expected gap between the end of the war in Europe and the proposed creation of a world security agency.

Diplomatic measures have been developed for continuing the commission into the peace period. They could be adopted by the three powers either through regular diplomatic channels or in a meeting of big-three leaders—President Roosevelt, Marshal Stalin and Prime Minister Churchill.

Better Girdles Loom As Restriction Lifted

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The office of the rubber director opened the way today for a better grade of girdles.

It lifted all restrictions on the use of neoprene by elastic thread manufacturers.

Up to now only a limited quantity of the high grade synthetic product has been available for civilian use. Girdle producers have been able to obtain all the buna-S, another synthetic they could use. But they preferred neoprene saying it made a better girdle, an ORD spokesman said.

The agency also revised its regulations to require 90 per cent synthetic rubber instead of 70 per cent in all medium sized highway truck tires.

Truck Tire Quota Up; Passenger Slashed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—The OPA tonight cut the September allocation of passenger car tires 350,000 casings under the August level, but increased the heavy truck and bus tire quota to 120,000, up from 85,000 for this month.

In reducing the passenger tire allotment from 1,950,000 tires to 1,600,000, OPA explained that reserve inventories built up last winter for the summer months have been used up.

In boosting the heavy truck and bus tire quota, OPA stressed that the critical shortage of these casings will not be entirely relieved. While the rayon allotment has been hiked to 102,000 heavy tires, the office of defense transportation estimates that a minimum of 165,000 casings are needed each month to maintain essential commercial transportation.

Surplus Property Action Stirs Row

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Provisions of surplus property disposal legislation passed yesterday by the senate stirred up a hornet's nest of opposition in the house today, presaging a long-drawn out fight in conference to iron out differences between the two branches.

In recess when the senate passed its own measure instead of the one sent over from the house, the house will not receive the bill until Monday, but house managers lost no time attacking it.

House leaders objected particularly to senate provisions creating an eight-man board to handle the disposal program, and giving public institutions the right to purchase or lease surplus property at a fifty per cent discount. The house specifically had rejected these proposals.

Chairman Manasco (D-Aala.) of the house expenditures committee which wrote the house measure in cooperation with Will L. Clayton, surplus war property administrator, said he would oppose both the senate changes. He will head the house conference to be appointed probably Monday.

Chinese Newspaper Sees Russia Vs. Japs Soon

CHUNGKING — (AP)—The Chinese newspaper, National Herald, which frequently reflects the views of the Chinese foreign office has predicted that Russia will join other United Nations in their war against Japan "in the near future."

The Herald, the only English language daily in free China made its prediction after lamenting the necessity of holding two separate conferences at Dumbarton Oaks in view of the fact that Russia has not declared war on Japan and has not participated in conferences at which China was represented.

"No doubt this duplication or shortcoming will be rectified in the near future when the soviet union joins in total war against axis powers and when all United Nations large and small sit in one and the same council," the editorial said.

New Flycasting Record Established In National Meet

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Robert Peros, Sr., of St. Louis set a new world record of 186 1-3 feet average and a 192-foot long cast for salmon fly casting in the 36th annual national fly and bait tournament.

The former record of 186 feet was held by Dick Miller of Huntington Beach, Cal.

Peros had little trouble in his field. Earl Osten of St. Louis was second with a 170 2-3-foot average and a long cast of 175, and E. E. Cavanaugh, Ft. Dodge, Iowa, third with a long cast of 173 feet.

New Phone Number At Red Cross is 63

A new telephone number is listed for the Lane county chapter, American Red Cross.

Hereafter, persons wishing to call the Red Cross are asked to call 63, the number having been changed from 225. The change was made when expanded service was given the Red Cross office, necessitating a new number.

Nutrition, Home Nursing Featured

Organization work for nutrition and home nursing will be pushed during September for the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross with the hope of getting all preliminary details lined up in time to open classes in these departments in October.

Mrs. W. S. Love is present head of nutrition for the Red Cross here, and Mrs. Glenn A. Harnden chairman of the home nursing work. Women interested in getting early information regarding the courses to be offered and need for the program, may call these respective chairmen.

Students Offered CAP

Eugene students interested in aviation and anxious to equip themselves for service in the war effort will soon have a chance to take voluntary training along military and aviation lines. Commander B. A. Martin, of the Eugene civil air patrol, announced Saturday.

Plans now are being discussed with Eugene school officials, he said, for the participation of Eugene students in the CAP program, and will be announced shortly.

Martin pointed out that there are at present more than 50,000 CAP cadets throughout the country, of whom more than 6,000 are members of the air corps enlisted reserve and more than 9,000 are girls. Through their training, cadets are performing many useful services for their country, Martin said, expressing confidence that Eugene boys and girls will welcome heartily the forthcoming plans for their participation in the national program.

Priority Clinic

A one-day priority clinic is scheduled for Eugene Tuesday in the chamber of commerce offices. It was announced Saturday by the priorities division of the war production board at Portland.

Nelson English will conduct the clinic and special emphasis will be given to lumber order L-335 as amended. English will be prepared to answer questions from lumber consumers of this area.

ment said that Bulgaria, at war with the U. S. and Britain but not with Russia, had announced its complete neutrality and ordered the nazis from the country. Moscow said Sofia warned the Germans that if in their retreat from Romania they cross into Bulgaria they will be interned.

The Moscow statement was followed swiftly by one from the Sofia radio which said Bulgaria had informed Russia of its intention to get out of the war as quickly as possible and had requested peace terms from the U. S. and Britain. It was learned reliably that such terms already are en route to Ankara for transmission to Sofia.

Ruse Means Death For Jap Gunners

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Many a Japanese gun crew, firing at what appeared to be a lone and lost Yankee fighter pilot, learned that they merely had fallen for a live bait trick and signaled for their own destruction.

The war department described the ruse in a story of how seventh airforce pilots solved one of the big problems of the Tinian island invasion operations—hidden machineguns and artillery.

The Thunderbolt pilots went out in teams of four, three flying at very high altitude while the fourth cruised low over areas believed to conceal gun positions. The pilots in the upper air kept a close watch on the decoy plane, and when the Japs began firing at him they came down fast and furiously with wing guns and bombs.

Three such teams knocked out nine machineguns and three anti-aircraft guns and also bombed coastal positions in two hours' time on one occasion.

China Envoys Visions Post-War Progress

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 26.—(AP)—China has great hopes for high development in the post-war era through trade, education, building and the return of the government to the people, C. H. Wang, Chinese vice consul revealed here today when interviewed soon after his arrival from China.

Post-war planning is well advanced in China, he said, and much of the work is planned in connection with cooperation with China's allies. "The country is now confident of victory after seven years of war, he commented.

Wang has never been out of China before, but he speaks English, having had six years of schooling in the language while attending a Christian college. His wife who is also here is just learning the language.
