Big Bean Deliveries At Cannery Again

Especially heavy deliveries of green beans are due at the Eugene Fruit Growers association cannery this next week. Deliveries dropped off some the past week, due to the several cool days, allowing the cannery to keep operations going in orderly fashion without being swamped.

Beans are being received at the cannery now, a good crop being

repacked, but canning operations will not begin for some time.

Corn will start coming in to the plant Wednesday of this week, and the first week in September will see the cannery going full force in canning the corn. Beets continue to come in, the cannery nearing the big season on beets.

Full-time workers are still needed at the cannery, especially men and boys of 16 years of age and older who can handle some of the heavier jobs.



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
