Black Devils Blaze Trail From Kiska To Southern France

WITH FIRST SPECIALIST
SERVICE FORCE, Southern
France, Aug. 20.—(Delayed)—
—Censorship released announce-
ment today of the presence in
southern France of the American
Canadian first special service
force and disclosed for the first
time some of the details about the
quintuple threat spearhead spe-
cialists who already had gained
fame as the Black Devils of Anzio.

The hard-hitting unit, trained
in snow, amphibious, mountain,
and airborne warfare as well as
close-in infantry fighting, was
conceived by Adm. Lord Louis
Mountbatten's advisers and was
born in a moment's conversation
between U. S. Army Chief of
Staff Gen. George C. Marshall and
Prime Minister Winston Churchill
at Chequers in April 1942.

It was activated July 20 of the
same year at Helena, Mont., under
Major Gen. Robert Frederick of
San Francisco, now an airborne
task force commander.

Force World-Wide

The "force," as it is called sim-
ply by the men, is employed on a
world-wide basis, being at-
tached to various armies at the
discretion of the combined chiefs
of staff.

At first it was intended for air-
borne sabotage and raiding in
Norway or the Carpathians.

But at 1:30 a. m. Aug. 15, 1943,
the force was the first into Kiska.

At 1:30 exactly a year later it
struck the first blow in southern
France.

In between those operations the
specialists surged from mountain
to mountain on the winter road to
Cassino, appeared on the Anzio
beachhead where they terrorized

Socialists To Have Overseas Radio Time

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—Re-
sponding to a contention that
President Roosevelt's Aug. 12
address at Bremerton, Wash., was
"political," the war department
has acceded to a socialist party
request for equal radio time to
broadcast to soldiers overseas.

Further, the war department
said, correspondence embracing
the socialist party's request and
its reply has been furnished to
the other major political parties.

Roosevelt spoke at Bremerton
from the deck of a destroyer
upon his return from a visit to
Hawaii, where he conferred with
Gen. Douglas MacArthur and
Adm. Chester Nimitz, and to
bases in the Aleutian Islands.

The war department announce-
ment was made in reply to a
press inquiry. It said:

"The socialist party has written
the war department that it defi-
nitely considers the president's
speech of August 12 at Bremerton
a political address and has re-
quested the war department, in
accordance with Title V, public
law 277, to give equal radio time
for a socialist party political ad-
dress.

"The war department has in-
dicated to the socialist party that,
under the statute, it will accede
to this request. The other major
political parties have asked for
and been furnished copies of the
correspondence between the war
department and the socialist
party in this connection."

Early Oregon Hop Harvest Looks Good

PORTLAND.—(AP)—Quality of
early Oregon hops is higher than
anticipated, the war food ad-
ministration said here in its
weekly hop market review.

Growers' reports indicated that
lack of rain during July might
have cut production slightly from
early estimates.

Picking of early hops, chiefly
fuggles, proceeded rapidly during
the week. The first carload of
1944 hops, loaded at Donald, Ore.,
moved eastward.

The new inspection system—
under which samples of all lots
are graded for leaves and stems
and for seed content—was in-
augurated in Oregon with the
shipment of the first car.

Trading remained very light.
