Material now on hand to make six gross of comfort kits. Kits of sewing now available. The stump box yarn now available and the need for these is urgent, Red Cross officials report. A special appeal has been made for knitted or crocheted items to be made here.

Knitting classes will form soon. Both afternoon and evening ones in session now too advanced for further instruction.
