

Plans For Reiser Funeral Pending

Arrangements for funeral services for Edwin E. Reiser, local mail carrier who was drowned Sunday in rescuing his son from the water, await word from one brother, a naval flier in the Alaskan service. It is hoped he may be able to fly here.

Reiser was born in Wisconsin, Nov. 15, 1907. He had lived in Eugene for the past six years, and was a member of Grace Lutheran church.

In addition to his wife, Evelyn, and two children, Wayne, 10, and Nancy, 2, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Reiser of Banks, Ore.; three brothers, Carl, of Portland; John, of West Allis, Wis., and Walter, of West Allis, Wis.; two sisters, Mrs. Lydia Mrs. Lydia Arndt of Portland and Mrs. Elsie Walter of Hillsboro.

The Branstetter-Simon mortuary will announce final plans for the funeral.

Paul Stiver, instead of Warren Combs, according to Mr. Combs, was responsible for recovery of Reiser's body after the accident, by diving. The wrong name was given to state police.
