Seven areas cooperate in staging this fair, Florence, Mapleton, Ada, Canby, North Fork, Cushman and Main River, and Siltcoos.

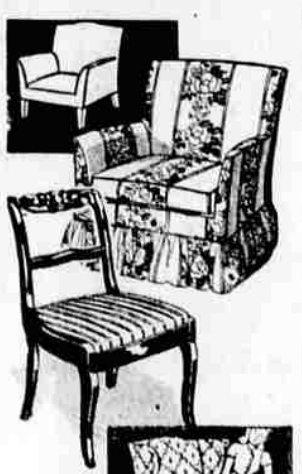
The divisions to be open are floral and hobbies, textiles, domestic processes, land products, in addition to the main 4-H event.
