CAPTAIN MANLEY

Announcement has been made by the India-China wing of the air transport command of the promotion of James C. Manley of Eugene to the grade of captain.

Captain Manley entered active duty in the army with Company M, 186th Infantry of Eugene, in September, 1940. He later was promoted to second lieutenant, infantry, and stationed at Fort Lewis, Wash.

In January, 1942, Captain Manley was transferred to the army air corps, where he received flight training, later being assigned to duty with the air transport command in India.

For the last 17 months, he has been flying the "hump" with more than 30 combat missions to his credit over Japanese-held Burma and China, and has received a presidential citation. This citation was awarded by the president to all members of his organization for outstanding performance of transporting supplies to China in December of 1943.

Mild irregularity persisted after the opening and near-closing trends were murky. Turnover of around 800,000 shares was another of the smallest for a full stretch since mid-May.
