We are not recommending the tryouts because of the complaints filed last year by several local boys who attended the National league club's tryout at Salem last year—including Charley Mickelson and Ranny Smith. . . .

Salem wrestling fans are reported to have gone "hog wild" at Salem last week when Jack Kiser defeated Paavo Katonen for the Pacific coast light-heavyweight championship. The fans carried the young St. Johns grappler out on their shoulders after he had pinned Katonen, and made the Finn very angry, with the use of his "skia-the-cat" hold. . . . The lone fall came early in the match and Kiser's speed and agility kept him out of Katonen's grasp the remainder of the match. Both matmen were bleeding from cut eyes after a rugged knockdown and drag-out in the final ten minutes of the match.

Speaking of wrestling, Mrs. Lloyd Pope, a former local resident who is now living at Taft, Cal., attended a match in Bakersfield recently and found George Wagner one of the performers. She writes, "I have never seen anyone wrestle any cleaner or better than he (Wagner) did that night. So, wrestling fans must remember there is good in everyone."

High school football, Lane county's only grid game for the second straight season, will get under way the second week in September as most of the preps prepare for season opening the last week in the month. . . . Pre-season predictions have it that Oregon City will be the "team to beat" in the No-Name league in which Eugene competes and that Lebanon and Cottage Grove will be favored in the northern and southern, Tri-County leagues, respectively, won by University and Springfield last season. . . .

Keith DeCourcy, the highly-touted fullback Gus Menger sent to The Dalles high from Maupin, has had a checkered collegiate football career. He played at Dartmouth as a freshman, returned to Oregon State, and now turns up at Washington where he is slated as Pest Welch's No. 1 fullback. . . .

Molalla high, slated to open the local grid season here at Civic Stadium against Uni High September 22 or 23, may use their coach. . . . Burton Bourgeois, ex-Eugene high basketball star and former coach at Nehalem after graduating from Oregon, has passed his army physical and awaits his call—which may come before the start of the season. He remains at Molalla high until called, however.

The new Cascade baseball league rule that provides the All-Star split to be made among players on the All-Star squad on a 60-40 basis instead of giving the cut to the league clubs, would have netted seven members of the Miller Lumbermen about \$20 each instead of the approximate \$8 they will get this year. . . . American Youth To Get Physical Tests

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—A nation-wide program to rebuild American youth into physically fit manhood will be launched in schools throughout the country with the opening of the new fall term, a joint committee of the American Medical Association and the National Council on Physical Fitness announced today.

"We do not aim at 'big muscle men' or super men," Dr. Morris Fishbein, of the AMA said. "We just want to get into the grandstands and get American kids back to health and physical fitness." John B. Kelly, Philadelphia, chairman of the National Council on Physical Fitness and one-time Olympic star, added.

"America has the greatest sports aristocracy in the world. But that cannot fight our wars for us," he concluded.

The first step to reclaim American youth who slunked with an average grade of 50 in the World War II draft call—Col. Leonard G. Rowntree, chief of the medical division of national selective service, pointed out—will be with the giving of physical examinations to the nation's school children, including heart x-rays, etc., the committee said.

St. Louis Browns Lose Muncie For Week

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Pitcher Bob Muncie, one of the mainstays of the St. Louis Browns' pennant drive, will be sidelined for at least a week and probably longer with a sprained right elbow, it was learned today following an examination by club physician Dr. Robert F. Hyland. He has won 12 games for the Browns so far this season.

Because they have for the occasion Quarterback Sid Luckman, an ensign in the merchant marine, the Bears—1943 National professional league champions—are favored to dodge defeat for the fifth time in the All-Star series. . . . Whether Luckman matches the sharp-shooting of Tulsa's Glenn Dobbs, whose passes helped the All-Stars scuttle the Washington Redskins 27-7 last year, may not settle the issue as much as the manner the reserve-club Bears can stave off the phalanx of All-Stars Lynn Waldorf can—and no doubt will—shoot into the fray.

Series Opens In St. Louis Oct. 4

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals will open their eighth World Series campaign Wednesday, Oct. 4, six weeks from tomorrow, when they meet the American league pennant winner at Sportsman's park in the opening game of what may be St. Louis' first cross-town series.

Although it still is possible for the Cardinals to lose out in the National league race, the possibility is so remote that the second-place Pittsburgh Pirates, who are 18 games behind, did not even have a representative at the World Series meeting in Judge Kenesaw M. Landis' office yesterday.

On the other hand, the American league was represented by all four of the first-division teams, the leading St. Louis Browns who stand 3½ games ahead of the second-place Boston Red Sox, the New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers, who are tied for third place, four games' ast of the Browns.

If the series is an all-St. Louis affair, it will be played Oct. 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 11. The Games of Oct. 4, 5, 9, and 11 would be considered home games for the Cards, although all contests will be played at Sportsman's Park.

If Detroit opposes the Cardinals, the Tigers would play at St. Louis on Oct. 4, 5 and 6 and then the scene would be switched to Detroit for the final games Oct. 8, 9, 10 and 11, if the full seven games are required.

Should the Cards' opponent be either the Red Sox or Yankees, the first three games would be played at St. Louis Oct. 4, 5 and 6 and then the locale would be switched to the east for the final games Oct. 9, 10, 11 and 13.

Regardless of which teams compete, the series will be a one-trip affair in compliance with a request of the office of defense transportation to cut travel to a minimum.

The third, fourth, sixth and seventh games will be played for the benefit of war relief and the servicemen's fund, while the \$100,000 to be paid for broadcasting rights also will go to servicemen. Last year, the sum donated to the servicemen's fund amounted to \$308,373.

Red Sox Move Ahead Of Yanks

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The Boston Red Sox; still supplying manpower for the armed forces, had enough left over Monday to oust New York from second place in the American league, moving 3½ games behind the leading St. Louis Browns by beating the Yankees 7-4.

Despite the loss of first-string catcher Hal Wagner and the impending departure of several others, the Red Sox played their usual spirited game and had enough batting punch to offset some shaky pitching by Yank Terry and Red Barrett.

Warner, who played his last game Sunday before his induction, was replaced by Bill Conroy, who played errorless ball, started a double play and scored a run after walking.

13 Walks by Boston Pitchers
Manager Joe Cronin, gambling on Terry, who has been ineffective most of the season, had to lift him in the fourth inning after he had issued five walks. His successor, Barrett, was no better yielding 8 passes during his five inning stay. However, the Yankees were feeble with men on base and 14 players were left stranded.

The Yankees made a final stand in the ninth when they scored three runs but Barrett ended the threat in time. Two of the four Yanks runs were forced home on walks.

Manager Cronin, hoping to reduce the margin between the Red Sox and the Browns before the team goes on its final western trip, said he would use his new pitchers from the west coast, Clem Dreisewerd and Rex Cecil.

The Browns open a two-game stand at Cleveland.

The St. Louis Cardinals, who have nothing more serious to do than get ready for the opening of the series at Sportsman's Park, came up with three runs in the last of the ninth to shade Cincinnati 3-2. Mort Cooper notched his 100th big-league triumph and 19th of the year with the help of Kenny O'Dea's two-run pinch homer. Harry Gumbert was the Cincy loser.

Major Batting Race Tightens

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Figure filberts sharpened their pencil points for a four-decimal-point finish as Stan Musial of the Cardinals led the National league stretch with a margin of .0007 and Bobby Doerr's American league lead was cut to three points by teammate Pete Fox of the Boston Red Sox, and Dick Siebert of the A's.

Musial still was on top at .3542 to Walker's .3536 but there was no end in sight. Everything pointed to a rough scramble right down to the Oct. 1 wire with New York's Joe Medwich, running third at .343, and Johnny Hopp of St. Louis, fourth at .337, given "dark horse" chances.

Doerr's challenge from Lou Boudreau of Cleveland faded as the Tribe pilot shuttled down to fifth, giving way to Fox and Siebert tied at .322 to Doerr's leading .325. Roy Cullenbine of Cleveland was the only newcomer in the top 10 in either league, taking ninth spot in the American as Ralph Hodgins of Chicago dropped down.

Tucson Eliminated In Legion Baseball

MINNEAPOLIS, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Albemarle, N. C., and Cincinnati were paired today in the American Legion national junior baseball tournament, with the loser scheduled to meet Brockton, Mass., which re-established itself in the series Monday by eliminating Tucson, Ariz., 4-1.

More than 3500 fans watched as Brockton, which had lost to Cincinnati in the opener last Saturday, handed Tucson its second defeat.

In an afternoon game, Ed Gibson of Albemarle struck out 15 batters to defeat Tucson 5-2.

Marine-Wings Win State Service Flag

Klamath Falls, Aug. 29.—(AP)—The Marine-Wings of Corvallis won the state servicemen's baseball championship by scuttling the winners of the Klamath naval aviation, 10-0, before an overflow crowd at Recreation Park here Sunday.

Big guns of the navy were completely silenced by the baffling slants of Pitcher Snyder of the Corvallis Wings, who is owned by the Philadelphia Phillies. He allowed only four hits, and at one stage of the game whiffed five men in a row.

The game on the navy side was filled with errors, the Sailors committing six bobbles.

This debacle probably winds up the season for the Klamath navy nine, which had its own way pretty much in southern and central Oregon, but lost two out of three to the Marines from Corvallis.

Nelson Winner In All-American

CHICAGO, Aug. 29.—(AP)—Byron Nelson won his third All-American Open championship in four years Monday and smashed all existing money-winning marks for a single year by shooting a three-under-par 69 for a 72-hole aggregate score of 280, eight under par.

Nelson, the golfer who never gambles on a shot, was the same cool perfectionist as he started out two strokes ahead of the field on the fourth and final round, fired a three under par 33 on the first nine, and then added an even par 36 on the back nine to boost this year's winning mark to \$25,468 in cash.

The record-rich open prize of \$13,462 in war bonds, which breaks down to \$10,100 in cash, hiked the hard-hitting Toledo, O., professional \$934 over the record mark of \$19,534 accumulated by Sam Snead in 1938.

Three Tied In Amateur
The winners in the other two tournaments which are part of the three in-one-all-American were: Betty Hicks, 1944 women's open champion, 318, 14 over par; and Ed Furgol, Detroit, Ken Heilmann, St. Louis, and Earl Christensen, Miami, Fla., who were tied with 295 for the 1944 amateur title.

Starting out sixth with a 54-hole total of 216, Ed Dudley, the picture golfer from Colorado Springs, Colo., shot hole-for-hole with Nelson to register a 69 and take second-place money of \$5000 in war bonds (\$3750 in cash) with a 72-hole aggregate score of 285.

Harold "Jug" McSpaden, who was the leading money winner going into this tournament with \$15,937 in cash, fell off badly on the last 18 for a 76—289 and seventh place as Cpl. Buck White, last year's runner-up to McSpaden, fired a 73—286 for third place.

The 32-year-old Nelson won the All-American in 1941 when he made his debut and took \$2000 of Promoter George S. May's money. He did the same thing in 1942 and took \$2500. Last year Nelson finished one stroke behind to tie for third and pick up \$900 in war bonds.

Such early flashes as Johnny Bulla, Atlanta, Ga., who tied the course record of 63 during his first round, and finished with 296, were shut out of the money.

Three-Way Playoff Set
In the amateur, Furgol, the tournament's medalist, blew his chance for the title when he came in on the back nine with a four-over-par 40. One stroke less and he would have beaten Christian Hansen and Heilmann who had finished earlier with a 71 and a 78, respectively, to tie at 295 strokes.

Christiansen, the Miami policeman, stayed in the running by the luckiest shot of the tournament. Shooting for the 18th green his ball hit a tree and bounced, toward the cup leaving him one-putt for a birdie 3 and the tie.

May said, after revising his previous rule, that the three amateurs will play 18 hole medal competition for the title.

Miss Hicks, the great iron player from Long Beach, Calif., bounced to a six over par 82, but her earlier rounds of 78-78-80 stood her in good stead and she won the championship by one stroke from Dorothy Germain, Philadelphia, 318 to 319. Georgia Tainter, Fargo, N. D., smashed her championship hopes when she shot an 11-over-par 87.
