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Aluminum Cut 15,000 Tons Each Month

PORTLAND, Aug. 31. — (UP) — Government owned aluminum plants at Troutdale, Ore., and Spokane, Wash., today were ordered to cut back their production nine million pounds a month as part of a war production board order from Washington ordering a national monthly cutback in eight plants of 30,000,000 pounds.
 Production of aluminum ingot also will be reduced at Vancouver, Wash., although WPB officials said the reduction figures were not yet available.
 The cut at Spokane will amount to 6,000,000 pounds while the Troutdale cutback totals 3,000,000 pounds of ingot per month.
 All personnel will be retained at the Troutdale plant where workers will merely shorten their hours to conform to the new production demands.
 Paul Hirsch, deputy regional WPB director for Oregon, stated that WPB ordered the cutback because of an adequate supply of aluminum ingot to care for both military and essential civilian needs.
 The government plant at Los Angeles will be shut down, releasing 500 workers for other war jobs in an acute labor shortage area.
 The new cutback leaves the national monthly production of aluminum ingot at more than 90 million pounds.

Goon The Coon Again Eludes Denver Traps

DENVER, Aug. 31. — (UP) — Goon the 'coon struck again today in Denver's Park Hill section, and eluded capture despite the elaborate preparations that had been made to snare him.
 Residents of the neighborhood which had been plagued by the shingle-gnawing, nocturnal creature were confident last night that the coon's hibernation of the past three nights would hold. They took this attitude because of the cooler weather in Denver — a condition believed to have discouraged the creature's ventures.
 But the goon outwitted his victims again. He waited until they had settled down for the night, then crept back to the scene of his original destructive spree — the home of William Weigle, which has since been re-roofed because the goon ate holes in it. Striking early this morning, the goon hardly gave the plotters against him time to prepare their various traps and devices for catching him.
 Those sure-fire coon-catching stratagems included booby traps and two Missouri Ozark hounds, bred in a coon-hunting atmosphere. However, by the time officers arrived to set the hounds on the trail and the neighborhood was aroused to put in motion their methods for avenging their shattered-roofs, the goon had shinnied down Weigle's roof into the darkness.
 That was too much for Park Hill residents and police. They are going to get the critter next time, they say.
 A troop of boy scouts also had made the capture of the goon number one on the list of current projects. But if he thinks that's all he has to worry about, the goon is mistaken.

Oregonian Helped Guard Invasion Papers

HEADQUARTERS, EUROPEAN THEATER OF OPERATIONS.—
 —An Oregon man played an important part in handling secret documents containing invasion plans and records of troop movements prior to D-day, the U. S. army has disclosed.
 Second Lt. Arthur H. Vincent, Tigard, Ore., and Warrant Officer (jg) Bernard Solomon, New York City, took charge of registering and safeguarding the hundreds of secret documents which came into the western base section headquarters in England.
 Plans regarding the invasion of France were kept in a steel-walled vault in an old English home, originally built to hold family silver. A huge steel key of a specially made pattern opened the steel vault door.
 The officers held orders to destroy all papers and records with thermite bombs stacked around the vault, if the documents were in danger of falling into enemy hands.

Young Opera Director Dies in Portland

PORTLAND, (UP)—Angelo Canarutto, 35, musical director of the New Opera company of New York, and a conductor of the Metropolitan opera, collapsed and died near here while en route to Oswego lake for a swim.
 He was a brilliant child prodigy in Italy. He came to this country in 1928 after studying at the Royal Conservatory in Trieste. He was a conductor for the Chicago Opera company in 1935, joining the Metropolitan staff in 1941.
