Two-County WAVE Platoon Planned

Designed to help fill the navy's need for personnel to operate the shore bases which exist to back up the fighting fleet at sea, organization of a full platoon of U. S. navy WAVE volunteers from Lane and Douglas counties has been initiated by the Eugene navy recruiting station, Chief W. E. Bell, recruiter in charge, announced today.

Simultaneously, Chief Bell announced that Jane E. Jamison, WAVE recruiting specialist third class (third class petty officer) for nearly a year attached to the Seattle district office of naval officer procurement, has been assigned to the Eugene station to aid in the intensive Lane-Douglas WAVE platoon recruiting drive.

WAVE Jamison, member of a prominent Portland family (her maiden name was Jane E. Gevurtz) already has taken up her post of duty at the local navy station where she will be available to discuss with interested young women of this area the opportunities for training, personal development and patriotic service open to them as members of the Women's Reserve of the U. S. Naval Reserve.

At least 30 newly enlisted Waves from Eugene and other communities in the territory under the local navy station will comprise the Lane-Douglas special Waves platoon. The platoon members will

depart from Eugene as a unit on Oct. 27, which date coincides with the annual national observance of Navy day.

It also will leave Portland as a unit for the transcontinental journey to the U. S. naval training center (women, reserves), the Bronx, N. Y., where newly enlisted Waves are indoctrinated in navy life and customs and trained in a multiplicity of important duties in which they replace navy men for assignment to seagoing units.

Members of the departing Lane-Douglas county special Waves platoon will be honored as a part of local ceremonies being planned to commemorate Navy day, Oct. 27, the date of their embarkation, Chief Bell said.

Platoon enlistments will be held open throughout September and until late in October. Night appointments to meet WAVE Jamison may be arranged by telephoning, calling at or writing the Eugene U. S. Navy substation.

Letter Says British Stand Up Remarkably Under Robot Raids

Londoners are "standing up remarkably" to the robot bomb menace which has been threatening every English household and filling the people with the worry of where the robots will fall and explode when their power runs out.

This uncertain sensation is described in a letter received here by Mrs. Everett E. Harpham, 1881 Elk drive, from her uncle, W. J. Kingston, editor of the fine arts and estates sections of the famous British magazine of the elite, Country Life. Because of his interest in fine old ancestral manors and halls, some of which date back hundreds of years, Kingston finds the recent destruction far more than personally distressing.

Having been evacuated with his wife from London to Kenton (Middlesex), New London, Kingston writes that they have "had a very uncomfortable time with Germany's flying bombs. You will, of course, have heard all about them, and (I am) happy to relate that very little damage from a 'war' point of view seems to have been done."

"The sorrowful part is the many little homes that have been damaged and some wrecked, as of course the bombs simply fall and explode whenever their power gives out," he continues. "It is that—the nature of uncertainty—that
