

Raiding Reverend's Victims Face Trial

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Cal., Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Legal aspect of Rev. Wesley G. Edwards' vigilante raid on Orange county slot machine operators was drawing hundreds of spectators today. A jury of five men and seven women was selected yesterday to hear the trial of Ray De Brouwer, cafe proprietor.

The first of two defendants to face trial on evidence provided

by the fighting preacher, De Brouwer was charged with possessing a coin-operated slot machine in his cafe.

Converted into a court room after municipal courts proved too small to hold the crowds, the auditorium was jammed for the first legal round to follow Rev. Edwards' crusade in which he reaped 13 slot machines.

A similar trial scheduled for Maude V. Martin, Garden Grove cafe operator, was to be held in Anaheim justice court Oct. 17.

Court Orders Trial On Burglary Charge

Cleared of a charge of parole violation, Harold W. Rhymer, 29, must, by federal court order in Portland, stand trial in Eugene on a burglary charge. He had been convicted previously of selective service violation and paroled from a five-year sentence on condition that he enter a civilian public service camp. He is now out on bail, Sheriff O. E. Crowe said Thursday.

Rhymer was arrested in Cottage Grove July 13 on a break-and-enter charge.

Lt. Lloyd N. Clarke Prisoner Of Germany

Word that her son, Lt. Lloyd N. Clarke, is a prisoner of war of the German government, following report that he was missing in action in a raid over Germany Aug. 3, has been received by Mrs. Alice Clarke, 690 Eleventh avenue west.

Lieutenant Clarke, 27, was pilot of a Liberator bomber with the 15th air force in Italy and went overseas Feb. 1, 1944. He entered service in February, 1942, was commissioned in the fall of 1943, and had only recently been raised to first lieutenant. He holds the air medal with cluster.

City Of Prato Falls To Allies In Italy

ROME, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Patrols of the American 8th army entered the road center of Prato in northern Italy and won new positions north of the highway between Prato and captured Lucca before the Germans' Gothic line, allied headquarters announced today.

Prato, industrial city of 60,000 population, is only 10 miles southeast of Pistoia on the western sector of the front.

Only slight gains were reported in the British 8th army's major offensive in the Adriatic sector, where allied forces entered Riccione Marina on the coast five miles southeast of Rimini and captured Besenigo, 2½ miles inland.

These advances were achieved after bitter fighting by infantry and tanks against the dogged and well entrenched nazis.

Fighting was reported heavy along a 14-mile front from the coast, with the 8th army steadily hammering a way through German tank and anti-tank gun defenses.

miles due east of Arbois and only a few miles from Switzerland.

The American 1st army and the British 2nd army were nearing a junction in Belgium. The Yanks captured Jodoigne, about 15 miles southeast of Louvain, which had been captured by the British.

Troops Pass Calais
The allied sweep along the channel coast closely invested Calais and Boulogne, and troops who by-passed Calais were reported approaching Dunkerque. Latest advances placed them in the area of Gravelines. The Canadian army was in a period of buildup and preparation while conducting limited operations.

Canadian troops reached the famous first world war town of Ypres, and front reports said the city was captured.

Rain and heavy clouds held down air operations early today. Headquarters disclosed that the German 1st army, a relatively small force formerly stationed in the Bay of Biscay area, had been mauled after being withdrawn to the Paris area and eastward. This made a total of four German armies defeated in northern France—the 7th, 15th, 1st, and 5th panzer army.

Nazis Not Seeking Peace, Official Says

LONDON, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—A spokesman for the British government stated emphatically last night that Germany has made no peace plea as yet to the united nations. He said the statement was made to dispose of recently recurrent rumors that Germany has been seeking opportunities to open talks with the allies.

The spokesman explained that any German peace emissary can approach the western allies only through Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, who will not give the order to cease firing until he obtains an unconditional surrender from the German high command, endorsed by the German general staff.

33 Eastern Mines Now Under Ickes

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 7.—(U.P.)—Thirty-three coal mines in Pennsylvania and West Virginia were under control of the department of the interior today in the government's effort to break strikes called by a subsidiary of John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers.

Fifteen mines were taken over last night on orders from President Roosevelt. They had been shut down by strikes of supervisory employees.

Five additional West Virginia mines were idle today because of walkouts.

Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes announced the mines would reopen Friday under government supervision. The mines produce 27,000 tons of coal daily.
