PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The Phillies announced today the purchase of Leslie George Scarsella, outfielder and first baseman for Oakland in the Pacific Coast league, for an undisclosed sum of money and two Phillies players, to be selected later.

Several clubs were reported to have bid for the 30-year-old left-hander, who has batted .335 this year to tie his teammate, Frankie Kelleher, for league honors. Scarsella, who has been given trials by the Boston Braves and Cincinnati Reds, has been in professional baseball 10 years.

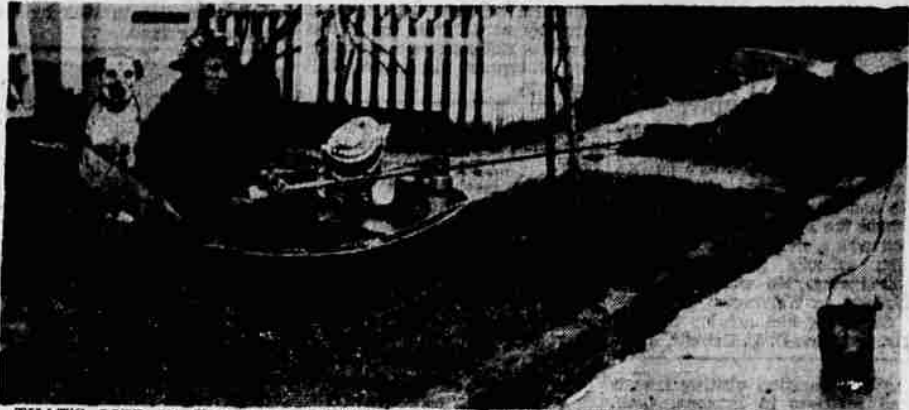

THAT'S LIFE IN THE WILLAMETTE VALLEY WATER SITUATION—Sometimes there's too much water, as in the top picture, taken in Eugene during the 1943 flood. Or else, during the dry summer months when irrigation is needed most, the rivers fall so low that a local fisherman has to find his fishing in a bucket, as shown in the lower view. Dams projected on the Willamette river and its tributaries would change all that, stabilize stream flow and eliminate flood damage. **The Reclamation Bureau And Willamette Valley Irrigation**

**The Reclamation Bureau**

U.S. reclamation bureau is agency through which farmers would obtain irrigation water from storage reservoirs.

Three irrigation projects have been given detailed study by the reclamation bureau in the Willamette valley — East Long Tom, 10,500 acres; Yamhill, 66,000 acres and Tualatin, 46,000 acres.

East Long Tom study completed but project rejected by farmers. Other project studies not completed.

Limited studies authorized on Salem project, North Santiam river.

Reclamation bureau official says Willamette valley has best irrigation possibilities in Oregon, but farmers show "opposition or disinterest" to reclamation proposals, so prospect for broad-scale irrigation remains in more distant future.

**EDITOR'S NOTE—**Herewith is the fifth installment of a series dealing with irrigation in the Willamette valley. Today's article discusses the U. S. reclamation bureau's position in the development of irrigation.)

Although the Willamette valley farmers are a bit standoffish in their attitude toward the U.S. reclamation service and have been looking down their sunburnt noses at cost estimates of reclamation projects, there is one point at which they must deal through the reclamation bureau, willy-nilly. That is when they want to get irrigation water directly out of the storage dams now or subsequently built by the army engineers.

Few of them ever may want to take water directly from the reservoirs, because operation of the dams is planned so that gradual release of stored water will maintain a higher summer flow of the streams and increase percolation to ground water supply. Farmers may organize and build their own systems to get water wherever they please, aside from the dams, just as they already are doing.

But whenever and wherever circumstances require direct access to the reservoirs, then they must talk to the reclamation bureau. The common procedure is to form an irrigation or "improvement" district and contract with the reclamation bureau for delivery of water from the reservoir. The bureau then constructs the irrigation system and the district pays the cost, in 40-year-installments, without interest. In addition the district pays an annual maintenance and operation fee.

There is an alternative plan mentioned by Dr. W. L. Powers, of Oregon State college, under which the reclamation bureau would construct the distribution system, then deliver water to the farmers on a rental basis for a period of 10 years, to establish its value.

Organization under such a plan, as described by Dr. Powers, would be a water users' association with each share representing right to an acre foot of water, and with the stock assessable but without creating a lien against the land.

"Within a decade," said Dr. Powers, "it would seem desirable to purchase a water right for the irrigable area of each ownership, in order to (1) get a priority of use, (2) secure a right to stored water for late summer use, and (3) appreciate the productive
