

Congress Has Key To W. V. Project

Unless the rivers, harbors and flood control bills now before congress are passed within a reasonable time, a hazard will be placed in the way of the Willamette Valley project. Col. Ralph Tudor, in charge of the Portland district of U. S. army engineers told Rotarians at their weekly luncheon Tuesday.

Tudor, luncheon guest speaker, explained that it takes time for engineers to work out plans and specifications for contractors and that procrastination in passing these two bills is liable to find the Portland district engineers' office without immediate plans for the project at the war's end.

Tudor estimated that \$20 million will be spent in the Willamette valley district in future engineering work.

In his talk, which told of the civil and military duties of the U. S. army engineers, Tudor recounted the methods by which civil works within an area are handed over to the army engineers for construction.

Tudor emphasized that the army engineers never instigate a program, that such is always done by a locality through congressional representatives, who in turn ask the engineers for an investigation.

Tudor stressed that the U. S. army engineers, in studying a project, always hold public meetings and confer with state and federal agencies on the scene in order to get well rounded ideas pertaining to a project.

"The whole process is one of democracy at work and everyone has a crack at it," the army man commented. The area and the people are considered and congress alone has the final say in authorizing a project and finally appropriating the money for construction, he said.

Col. Tudor, while emphasizing the importance of post-war engineering projects, did not take a light view of the present military conflict. He told Rotarians that there was a stiff fight ahead and that the military side of the army engineers would be more im-

German Prisoner Use In Klamath Area Hit

PORTLAND Ore., Sept. 21—(U.P.)—In a report to James T. Marr, executive-secretary of the Oregon State Federation of labor, the Klamath Falls Building and Construction Trades council, (AFL) have charged that German prisoners of war were being used in the Klamath area for other than agricultural industry.

The statement said that the prisoners were being used in garage and plumbing shops.

Marr said that "once before" attempts had been made to employ war prisoners in Oregon canneries but that the action had been frustrated when the federation protested to the war manpower commission that their use was in competition with free labor.

Marr said that the Portland office of the WMC had no knowledge of war prisoners being used in the Klamath Falls area.

Profiteering Charged On Shotgun Shells

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 20—(U.P.)—Disclosure of attempts to gouge the public by exorbitant charges for shotgun shells in this area was made today by Ralph Westering, price specialist in the district OPA.

Westering said purchasers have paid as high as \$5 for a box of 25 twelve-gauge shells, which should have cost no more than \$1.38, or 7 cents per shell, the ceiling price.

The 30-06 caliber shells should retail for \$2.15 for a box of 25 and the 30-30 caliber for \$1.50, he said, adding that some retailers have charged as high as \$1 per shell for these sizes.

Price control applies to sales by individuals as well as by dealers, Westering said.

Denmark Uprising Quelled By Nazis

STOCKHOLM, Sept. 21—(U.P.)—Order was reported restored in Copenhagen Wednesday after German troops quelled an uprising which involved clashes with Danish police resisting internment and a pitched battle outside the royal palace when seven German sailors were killed and a palace official was wounded seriously.

The Swedish telegraph agency reported in a Copenhagen dispatch that Danish State Secretary Eivind Larsen, Police Chief K. Begsgroup-Hansen and Police Director P. Stamm had been interned at Gestapo headquarters.

The dispatch said that all Danish policemen under 56 years old had been interned on ships in the Copenhagen harbor.

(The German Transocean news agency announced today that a state of emergency had been declared in Denmark and that the Danish police force had been suspended.)

The Danish liberation council announced that a general strike which began at noon yesterday would end today. The agency appealed to Danes to remain calm "since the hour of open resistance had not yet arrived."
