

\$50,000 Suit Filed For Logger's Death

Claiming \$50,000 damages for the death of her husband, Harold W. Mayben, Aug. 4, 1943, Glenna G. Mayben has filed suit in circuit court against George Giustina and others, doing business as the Giustina Bros. Lumber company.

The plaintiff alleges in her complaint that her husband was employed by G. H. Clark as a

logging truck driver and that on the date mentioned he was working at a log-loading boom in the Gate creek area when a log rolled off the truck, killing him instantly. He was 25 years old at the time of his death, the complaint says.

Roosevelt Flays Argentine Regime

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today denounced the Argentine government for what he termed the growth of nazi-fascist influences developing in that country at the very time when nazi forces are facing defeat in Germany.

Roosevelt said Argentina has repudiated a solid inter-American system for defense against nazi aggression and stated, in the

words of Prime Minister Churchill of Great Britain that every nation will be judged by the part it plays in the war, neutrals and belligerents alike. He said his statement today is important now because of deceptions on the part of nazi radio broadcasts beamed to Argentina which say allied councils are divided in their attitude toward Argentina. Roosevelt described the broadcasts as fabrications.

Test Run Set For New Chambers Mill

COTTAGE GROVE.—Test run for the new sawmill plant of J. H. Chambers and Son at the south end of town is scheduled for next week.

The new mill replaces the one destroyed by fire about two years ago, and construction on the new plant has been underway for the past 16 months.

The mill will employ approximately 100 men and its capacity will be between 100,000 and 125,000 board feet daily.

J. H. Chambers is one of the best known Willamette valley lumber operators, having been in business in the Cottage Grove area well over 40 years.

Security Talks End Without Red Accord

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The Russian phase of the Dumbarton Oaks world security conference has ended without complete agreement on plans for a new league of nations, a joint communiqué revealed today.

"These conversations have been useful," the communiqué said, "and have led to a large measure of agreement on recommendations for the general framework of the organization, and in particular for the machinery required to maintain peace and security."

The three delegations are making reports to their respective governments who will consider these reports and will in due course issue a simultaneous statement on the subject.

The Anglo-American talks with the Chinese delegation on the same subject began at 3 p. m. today at a formal ceremonial session. Representatives of the three countries will make opening addresses.

streaked across the city from the east circling north and east of Cavite naval base's big anti-aircraft guns.

Helldivers screamed down from 10,000 feet and pulled out over shipping inside the harbor's breakwater.

Torpedo planes came in over the water from the west, a long, thin line of grayish blue planes. A few enemy fighters who managed to take off flicked in and out of the clouds, not eager for combat.

One Zero streaked desperately over the water dodging from side to side with two Hellcats in pursuit.

Smoke from the stricken ships billowed over the Pasig river and south over the Manila hotel which is now a high Jap officers' residence. Anti-aircraft fire erupted from vacant lots and from Dewey boulevard, part of which now serves as an assembly and take-off strip for Japanese aircraft.

Our bombs fired the floating drydock, U. S. S. Dewey, which the Japs captured at Subic bay in the first days of the war and towed to Manila harbor.

Like Football Player

Meantime, torpedo planes were coming in low over the water like football players moving down field at the kickoff. The torpedoes were dropped and all but two got away straight and true. This carrier's squadron scored five certain hits and two probables.

Our planes had rough going at times. We lost 11 planes the first day.

One flier was heard to announce calmly: "This is Mac. I'm going in." Nothing more was heard from him.

The great Atlantic Gulf and Pacific refinery along the waterfront was set ablaze and other oil storage facilities were on fire.

The attackers found good shipping targets the second day although some undamaged vessels evidently departed during the night.

As we head southward, few can disagree with the rear admiral commanding this division who turned to me and said: "This is one of the greatest victories of the war."

Record Turkey Crop May Be Too Small

WASHINGTON, (AP)—A record turkey crop will go to market this season but the supply will not meet the demand in view of high purchasing power and large military needs, the agriculture department has predicted.

Turkey production is expected to exceed 500,000,000 pounds, or about eight per cent above last year.

Marketing of chicken meat probably will fall below the last three months of 1943 and prices of most classes of poultry meat may hover close to ceilings, the department said.

Although egg production during the last quarter of this year may drop below the same period of last year, the report said, civilian supplies are expected to be larger as the result of declining war requirements for dried egg powder and record storage stocks of eggs.

Largest Negro Paper Will Support Dewey

PITTSBURGH, (AP)—The Pittsburgh Courier, largest negro newspaper in the United States, said in a front-page editorial Thursday that it would endorse Gov. Thomas E. Dewey for the presidency.

The weekly publication, with a nation-wide circulation of 300,000, is distributed in 14 editions to most of the large cities in the pivotal states and the Pacific coast.

DENVER, Colo.—(AP)—The University of Denver again will have an all-civilian football team, composed mostly of 17-year-olds, 4F's and men discharged from the service.

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'Lower 13' Bride's Widower Killed

SEATTLE, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The 13th naval district today announced that Lt. Richard F. James, whose bride was slain in the "Lower 13" Pullman car murder case in Oregon a year ago last January, was killed yesterday when his small training plane crashed about 20 miles northwest of Pasco, Wash. He was the son of Mrs. Lucille Floyd James, Nassawadox, Va.

His bride of four months, Martha Virginia James, 21, formerly of Norfolk, Va., was killed by a man who entered her berth and cut her throat shortly after 4 a. m., Jan. 23, 1943, as she was enroute from Seattle to San Diego, Calif.

The state accused Robert E. Lee Folkes, negro dining car cook, of slaying her. Folkes was convicted and was to have been executed in Oregon's gas chamber but his counsel obtained a stay pending appeals.

Japs Claim U. S. Air Base In China Taken

Imperial headquarters announced Friday that Japanese forces advancing on Kweilin, capital of Kwangsi province in China, had occupied Paoching and Tangchuk, site of an advanced American air base.

There was no immediate confirmation of the Japanese claim, contained in a broadcast communiqué from Tokyo recorded by the federal communications commission.

A Chinese communiqué Thursday reported severe fighting around Paoching, which is about 150 miles north of Kweilin, and said Japanese forces advancing from Wuchow had reached the outskirts of Tanchuk.

Tanchuk is about 80 miles south of Kweilin and 47 west of Wuchow.

Lawyers Hear Appeal For National Unity

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 29.—(AP)—J. F. Kilkenny of Pendleton, opening the 10th annual convention of the Oregon Bar association here, of which he is president, today appealed to lawyers of the state to combat the wave of intolerance and prejudice that "threatens to divide the nation."

Kilkenny warned that the U. S. would enjoy no lasting peace if again, faced with civil war, and asserted that "it would be a crime if lawyers should write themselves off as a factor of efficiency and power to preserve American institutions."

CHINESE ADMITTED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has signed a bill granting Henry White, a Chinese boy, permanent admission to the United States. The boy is the adopted son of Kenneth M. White of Portland, Ore., and is a recent graduate of a junior high school in Los Angeles.

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Fisher Brothers Plan Oregon Business

SALEM, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The Fisher Motor company, a Delaware corporation organized when the Fisher brothers retired recently from General Motors, filed an application yesterday to do business in Oregon.

The new company's application says it will build and sell automobiles, planes, trucks, trailers, and parts.

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
