Nurse's Aides Group Told About New Needs

First regular meeting of the Red Cross nurse's aides group of Eugene was held the past week with Cpl. Quentin Geyer of the army recruiting office in Eugene; Miss Mary Gray of San Francisco, Pacific coast director for nurses for the Red Cross; and Mrs. Condon C. McCormack, chairman of the nurse's aides division for the Lane county chapter, American Red Cross, as speakers.

Corporal Geyer stressed the need for women enlisting in the hospital corps and told of various jobs that the hospital corps needed, as well as telling how work in nurse's aides provides these qualifications.

Miss Gray announced that Lane county was the first group to admit its quota on the Pacific coast, having 187 nurse's aides. She outlined the hospital capacity in Eugene and gave information on needs to keep all

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hospitals functioning to capacity here. In addition to work at the Sacred Heart and Eugene hospitals, nurse's aides also are needed at Rhoads-Lambert hospital, the Sunset home, the Faren home, the Bird home, and the university infirmary.

Announcement was made that the local nurse's aides group will have opportunity to take additional training following completion of the 150 hours required for duty. Additional courses would include child care, instructions on the Kanny treatment, public health, etc.

Miss Pauline Tower is president of the nurse's aides organization here.
