

Junior Red Cross Program Starts Year

The program of Junior Red Cross is being organized for a big year under the direction of Mrs. Kenneth W. Moore, who is the new chairman from the Lane county chapter, American Red Cross, for the Junior Red Cross activities.

Any school of the county desiring to undertake a Junior Red Cross project may contact the local Red Cross office for material.

The Junior Red Cross roll call will be held Nov. 1-13 for 1944-45, states Mrs. Moore. Material will be distributed in October to all schools for enrollment during the roll call. The final check on the enrollment will be made Nov. 13 at the teachers' institute at Woodrow Wilson junior high school by the Junior Red Cross chairman. An exhibit of work of the junior group and information on it will be featured at the institute.

Schools already contacted and functioning in Junior Red Cross projects include Eugene high, the shop there to make 24 lap boards, 12 lap trays, 12 writing boards, 50 wooden games, 25 wooden puzzles as a project.

Also, art classes in the junior high schools will work on 500 navy menu covers to be hand decorated.

Creswell, Cottage Grove, Florence, and Mapleton grade school also have been contacted, but as yet no projects have been announced from them until further organization is completed.

If they personally had the cash. He related from personal experience and knowledge how war prisoners and soldiers in isolated areas, just "eat up anything in the way of amusement or diversion," which takes them away from the desolation of their surroundings.

A plea for the home-front USO was strongly sounded by the medical officer who said that "No news and monotony that a pass carries."

"The soldier feels like a number so much of the time that he craves the personal attention he gets at USO clubs. It makes him feel like an individual again," General McCormack said.

The dollars collected for service agencies are badly needed as he asserted in urging everyone to give unstintingly to the 1944 campaign.

Aiton Baker, campaign chairman, who spoke briefly to the county leaders, reminded them that it is only in the free countries of the world that people can come together to "help their own." "We have the right under the constitution," he said, "to come together to plan for the protection of the next generation and to give them their chance."

Other short talks were given by Olaf Hougum, general chairman, and Kenneth Wells, executive secretary of the campaign. Ed G. Boehnke was toastmaster.

During the evening solos were sung by Hal Young, Eugene tenor.

Teacher Shortage Hits Schools Here

An urgent need for former teachers and other qualified persons to do substitute teaching in the Eugene schools while regular teachers are absent from their classrooms with harvest platoons, has been announced by Dr. H. M. Gunn, superintendent.

Available substitute teachers are very scarce, so scarce in fact, Dr. Gunn disclosed, that some principals have reported calling three to five persons who have served in previous years and finding that they were no longer available.

Former teachers, because of their experience in the classroom, are most desired as substitutes due to the reduced loss in efficiency, he explained, adding that persons of some training and good educational background can, however, do satisfactory work as substitutes in certain grades and classes.

It was revealed that the need for substitutes is acute because several teachers are out each day with harvest platoons gathering the nut crop which is now coming on and which has not yet reached its peak.

The school board of District 4 voted recently to allow teachers working with platoons their regular salaries and to pay their substitutes. Dr. Gunn also said that growers have found that children work more efficiently under the leadership of their teachers.

Substitutes in the local schools are paid at the rate of \$8 a day, the superintendent revealed, and asked that prospective substitutes call at the school office on the second floor of the city hall to fill out an application blank. If a personal call is not possible, a telephone call to 40 will result in a blank being sent, he explained.

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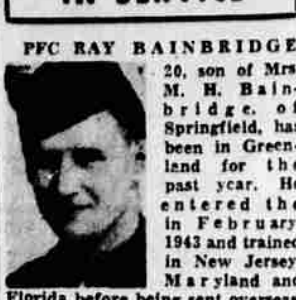
plants and air bases on a broad front stretching between the Karlsruhe area of the Rhineland near the northeastern tip of France to the Nurnberg area 140 miles to the east.

Patton Advances
Lt. Gen. George S. Patton's American 3rd army also gained new ground, seizing heights five miles northwest of the French stronghold of Metz, permitting direct observation into the city. Patton's men also extended their penetration of the Parroy forest six miles northeast of Lunerville to three and a half miles, but opposition was very stubborn, a front dispatch reported.

American and French units of the 7th army at the southern end of the front pushed ahead at a number of points in the Epinal sector, midway between Nancy and Belfort, and captured Ronchamp, west of Belfort, but a front dispatch said the campaign to force the Belfort gap into Germany was bogging down in mud and rain.

To the north, the British 2nd army widened its corridor into Holland with an advance of five to six miles across water-logged ground northwest of Eindhoven to Meijel, eight miles from the Meuse river.

Morse Urges Labor To Watch Its Path

American labor should look to see where its political path is leading it, said Wayne L. Morse, republican nominee for the six-year term in the U. S. senate, in talking to a republican gathering at Drain, Monday evening.

"I want to see American labor remain free to carry on its negotiations at a free collective-bargaining table. It is not in the interest of American labor to look to the federal government to solve its disputes," Morse commented.

Farmers can not solve their problems with a "false economy of scarcity," the candidate said, adding, "five-cent beef on the hoof and 40-cent beef in the butcher shop does not make horse sense."

Touching on multiple trade

agreements, Morse said we do not want to flood our market with Argentine mutton, wool, and beef, but we do want to send Argentine the machinery she needs; so, an but we do want to send Argentina answer would be for Argentina in wool to China where it is needed, and we take products we need from China.

Later, Morse declared, a senator should go to the senate ready to fight for and promote that legislation which promotes the economic interests of Oregon—adding, in the lumber industry we are at a great disadvantage with Canada due to preferential trade agreements, yet lumber is a mainstay of Oregon. We are going to have careful consideration of revision of the preferential provision in the trade markets of the world, he told the Drain group. He reminded them that their sons overseas can send a cable home by British communications for one-half the price it costs over our own system.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Specialties, principally in the low-quoted category, attracted most of the buying in today's stock market while profit taking served to stall leaders of the late September upswing.

Volume tapered after considerable forenoon activity centering in issues selling under \$10. Gains of fractions to a point were maintained for selected movers near the close, but declines were plentiful. Transfers were around 700,000 shares. Buoyant aircraft of the past week or so were in supply. Bonds were uneven.

At peaks for the year or longer were Continental Motors, Texas Pacific Land Trust, Pennsylvania, Central Airlines, Atlas Corp., General Realty and Hiram Walker. Resistant were American Airlines, Santa Fe, Standard Gas Preferred, Commonwealth & Southern Preferred, Consolidated Film common and preferred and Dow Chemical. Stock engaged a flurry after midday but quickly trimmed their advance. Backward were Montgomery Ward, Chrysler, GenCorp, Northern Pacific, Studebaker, Douglas Aircraft, Grumman and United Aircraft.
