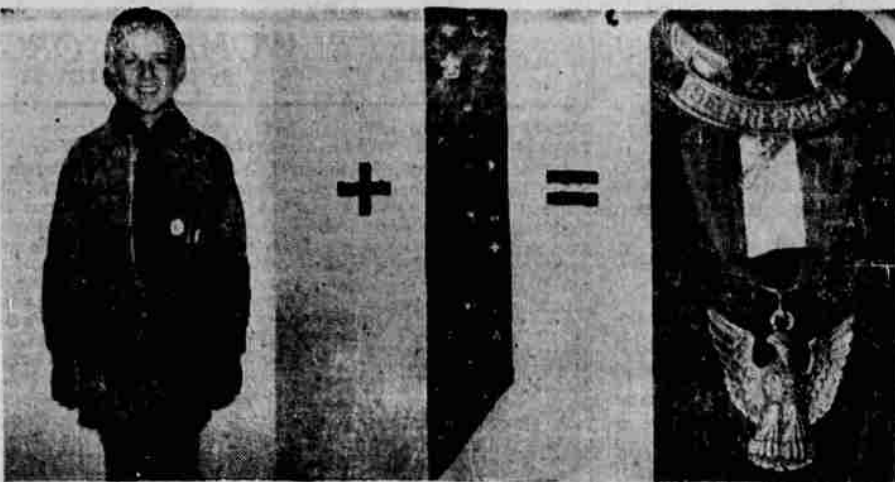

Tenderfoot's Pledge Fulfilled As Eagle Scout Rank Earned

A promise made by Scout Neil Chase as a tenderfoot to his scoutmaster, Howard F. Needham, two and a half years ago that he would be the first eagle scout under Needham's direction of Troop 67, was fulfilled Thursday when the young scout received the highest advancement award in scouting at a court of honor at Woodrow Wilson junior high school.

When he raised his right hand to the scout sign and took the scout oath at a tenderfoot investiture ceremony on May 18, 1942, Neil, then just 12 years old, was told by Needham that as scoutmaster he had never had an eagle scout in Troop 67. Neil promised that he would receive the rank of eagle scout and that he would be the first scout to receive the award while Needham was scoutmaster of the troop, sponsored by the First Baptist church of Eugene.

Neil's record shows that he progressed steadily, becoming a second class scout in February 1943, first class scout in June 1943, star scout in October 1943, and life scout in February of this year.

Requirements for the eagle scout award are that a scout shall have at least six months' satisfactory service as a life scout and shall have earned 21 merit badges, 13 of which are required. An applicant for the eagle scout award is reviewed by the eagle scout board of review of the Oregon Trail Council, which is headed by Walter H. Banks, chairman of the council advancement committee, and the application must be approved by the national council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Merit badges earned by Neil (and shown in the picture above, reading from left to right and top to bottom) are home repair, music, metal work, personal health, pioneering, athletics, horsemanship, swimming, public health, first aid, farm home and its planning, scholarship, hog and pork production, wood work, safety, farm layout and building arrangement, pathfinding, carpentry, civics, animal industry, conservation, life saving, forestry, camping, cooking and bird study.

Since the young scout has earned 26 merit badges, 5 more than required for the eagle scout rank, he will be eligible for a bronze palm after six months' satisfactory service as an eagle scout.

Brother Is Scout
Neil is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Merle D. Chase and has a brother, Norman, who is also a member of Troop 67.

Only about one out of every 100 scouts receives the eagle scout award, and this is the second award to be presented this year in the Oregon Trail Council, which is made up of six counties in western Oregon. The last award was to Keith Woolley of Cottage Grove last April.

The award was made at the court of honor being sponsored by the Tsiskian lodge of the Order of the Arrow, national brotherhood of Boy Scout honor campers. Neil was one of the youngest charter members of the local lodge, which recognizes outstanding campers from Camp Lucky Boy, summer camp of the Oregon Trail Council.

As the result of his leadership ability, Neil was selected by his fellow scouts this week as senior patrol leader of Troop 67, and he will take on his new leadership duties at the troop's meeting next Monday.

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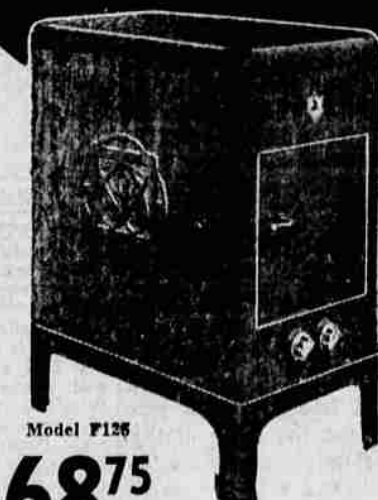
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
