

Threat By Bridges Charged By Morse

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Wayne L. Morse, republican senatorial nominee, charged today that Harry Bridges had threatened to oppose his candidacy unless Morse shifted his support from Gov. Dewey to President Roosevelt.

Morse, endorsed by the CIO in the primary, made the statement shortly after state CIO officials accused the San Francisco labor leader of interfering in Oregon affairs.

Morse's assertion that Bridges, as president of the International Longshoremen's Union, would attempt to withdraw CIO support, gave further indication of a battle at the state CIO convention opening here Tuesday.

Previously Robert T. Baker, Oregon CIO president, had challenged Bridges to attend the convention and explain why he opposed Baker's appointment as Oregon director of the national political action committee.

Cordon Tells Triple Goal Of Congress

ROSEBURG, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Congress last session was focused on a triple goal: winning the war, guaranteeing future peace, and establishing the transition to a peacetime world.

So said Sen. Guy Cordon last night in his first statewide broadcast since returning from Washington to campaign for election to the senate.

Cordon, speaking from his home town after a gala welcoming celebration, said congress' main task—after winning the war—is to provide a stabilized domestic order with full employment.

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Black Dragon Society Chief Dies In Japan

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Japan's domei agency Thursday announced the death of Mitsuru Toyama, 90-year-old head of the Black Dragon society, Japanese terrorist patriotic organization.

The dispatch, intercepted by the federal communications commission, said the "saint" of the terrorist movement died at his summer home Wednesday night of a long illness.

FCC Far Eastern monitors described him as "one of the most powerful political bosses in Japan, believed to be the power behind the Tojo government and responsible for the present greater East Asia war."

The Black Dragon society figured prominently in Japanese espionage in the United States. The FBI repeatedly reported the arrest of Black Dragon men early in the war when it was rounding up dangerous aliens.

More than a hundred Lane county filbert growers attended a demonstration of a new suction-type mechanical filbert harvester in the orchard of Burr Fitch, northwest of Springfield Thursday afternoon.

Ralph Lundy of the agricultural engineering department of the state college at Corvallis gave the demonstration and, according to those present, it was very successful. The demonstration was arranged by the Lane County Horticultural society, in cooperation with O. S. Fletcher, county agent.

B. F. Goodpasture and sons of Vida are working on a harvester of their own and when it is completed they will stage a demonstration at their large orchard on the McKenzie river.

Vacancies Reported In Evening Radio Classes

There are still vacancies in the evening radio class at the Eugene vocational school, it was revealed Friday. This class meets every night, Monday through Friday, between 7 and 10 p. m.

Training is offered in the construction, maintenance and operation of radio receivers, public-address amplifiers and similar electronic equipment. School officials also disclosed that trainees need not have any previous background in radio, and that all necessary equipment and supplies are provided without cost.

A few more students can also be accommodated in the afternoon radio section, which meets from 1 to 5 p. m., Monday through Friday, it was announced.

Margarine Makers Forsee Shortage

CHICAGO, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Margarine manufacturers, reporting heavy demands for their product from consumers unable to buy butter, predict a shortage of the butter substitute.

The industry is operating on a government quota basis, making 187 per cent of its production in the basic years of 1940-41. Until about a year ago this quota was set at 180 per cent.

Doggone! Plane Was Ready But Dog Gone; Coos Bay To Be Mascot

United Airline officials here prepared a take-off reception Friday for a Marshfield dog of war, which was en route east—armed with a bottle of milk and a saucer—to a midwest army camp.

Everybody was there, except the dog of honor.

The dog had been inadvertently misdirected by train to Portland, following his arrival here from Marshfield.

The dog, Coos Bay, a diminutive Belgium Shepherd puppy is headed for Bruning, Nebraska, from Marshfield, to become mascot for an army air force unit of fighter pilots. He was consigned to Lt. C. W. Hilton, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Hilton of Marshfield, and was sent to fulfill the request of the airmen for a puppy mascot. Coos Bay was from aliter sister by Hilton's own dog, Wolf III.

The Marshfield chamber of commerce and The Coos Bay Times presented the puppy to the unit and to speed the infant mascot on his way received special permission from United Airline to send him air express from Eugene.

Friday morning a battery of cameras awaited at the Mahlon Sweet field to snap the pup as he was taken aboard the mainliner by the United Airlines' stewardess.

But, alas, when Coos Bay arrived in Eugene, early Friday morning from the coast hinterland, some trainman failed to take Coos Bay to the airport and he was shunted onto a Portland express, leaving Eugene air officials high and dry.

Demobilization Will Be Swift-Stimson

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said Thursday that no "political or economic factors" entered into the army's plans for partial demobilization of its forces upon the defeat of Germany.

The speed of army demobilization, Stimson said, will be governed solely by two factors—the extent of forces needed to defeat Japan quickly, and available shipping.

Except for those two limiting factors, the army is planning to discharge soldiers as quickly as possible, Stimson told his press conference.

Stimson warned that a tendency had appeared on that part of the public to relax security precautions designed to prevent information about troop movements from "leaking" to the enemy. This tendency, he said, must be checked.

This tendency is especially serious at a time when the army is preparing to shift huge forces from Europe to the Pacific, Stimson said.

Hospital Experience Given Cadet Nurses

Army hospital experience for senior cadet nurses while in training is now available at four military general hospitals in the 9th service command it was announced today at the Fort Douglas, Utah, headquarters of Brig. Gen. J. M. Willis, command surgeon.

During the cadets' six months in an army hospital, they receive supervised training in clinical services and classes under a ward teaching program.

Although neither officers nor government employees, cadets live in army quarters, eat with the officers, and receive many army nurse corps benefits.

Full subsistence is provided with no deductions taken from the \$60 paid monthly while on duty. Following a six months training period, cadets return to their nursing schools to complete their course.

In addition to a preview of army nursing, cadets are given classes during this period of service which meet requirements for graduation from recognized schools of nursing.

Journal Gives Support To Senator Cordon

PORTLAND, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The Oregon Journal, which announced recently that it would support President Roosevelt for reelection, supporter Guy Cordon, republican candidate for U. S. senator, in an editorial, the editorial stated.

"The first of these is the development and use of Oregon raw materials, the improvement of transportation and the building of facilities and organizations for trade."

"The second is that in the congress rents the authority to deal with taxes, to stabilize the national economy and to fix and meet the obligations of this nation in winning the war and in making sure of continued peace through effective international organization against war."

"Senator Cordon is entitled not only to election but a hearty majority on November 7."
