

Tree Farm Dedication Set; Cordon Speaker

COTTAGE GROVE—On Thursday, Oct. 12, United States Senator Guy Cordon will formally dedicate two West Coast tree farms in the vicinity of Cottage Grove. The forest lands of the J. H. Chambers and Son firm and the W. A. Woodard Lumber company will be certified by Sen. Cordon as managed forest areas dedicated to the perpetual growth of forest crops.

The general public will be invited to attend ceremonies, at which time the lumber firms will receive certificates admitting them to membership in the American tree farm systems and the West Coast tree farms. Tentative plans indicate a dinner meeting with citizens of this community and vicinity as guests of the Chambers and Woodard firms. Definite arrangements will be announced later.

The chamber of commerce officially will sponsor this meeting and urges all citizens who can possibly do so, to attend the dinner and hear Sen. Cordon. The dinner will be served promptly at 6 o'clock, so that it will be possible to go to Eugene later in the evening in order to hear Gov. John W. Bricker.

Sen. Cordon will tell what effect tree farming will have on the economic stability of this community in future years, and the efforts being made by private timber owners to provide crops of trees. He also will tell residents of Cottage Grove how they can help in this program and why the spread of tree farming should be encouraged.

H. J. Cox, secretary-manager of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, will be the toastmaster for the evening. Distinguished representatives of private and public forestry in the northwest, U. S. forest service and O. and C. officials, newspaper people, and others will be here for the function.
