

Principals To Attend Administrator's Meet

A state school administrators' council will be held Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at Salem under the auspices of the state department of education. It was announced late Saturday by Clarence Hines, assistant superintendent of city schools. Principals of Eugene elementary, junior and senior high schools, and Dr. Henry Gunn, city school superintendent, and Hines will attend.

The three groups of principals will meet Monday, and Hines, as chairman of the committee on "In Wartime and After," will report to the high school principals in the afternoon. He will report Tuesday morning, with Gunn presiding, at the joint meeting of superintendents and principals, who will meet to consider common problems. This report will concern the committee "In-Service Training of Teachers." Separate meetings of superintendents will be held Wednesday.

Bostonian Says East Can Help West Build

PORTLAND, Oct. 7.—(AP)—Reports that eastern industrialists are attempting to "sabotage" northwest development were denied here by Erwin Canham, managing editor of the Christian Science Monitor.

The Boston man told interviewers that industry in his part of the country does not fear western competition. Eastern firms—following the example of New England textile mills in the southern states—will take advantage of northwest development by establishing western branches, he said.

Canham warned, however, against regulations which would artificially retard eastern plants' transition to peacetime industry in order to give the west a head start.

"Industry should not be promoted artificially in the west any more than held artificially in the east," he said. "Increased and more efficient production cannot harm any part of the United States from the long-range point of view."

Local Soldier Fights With 'Kraut-Killers'

WITH THE 5TH ARMY, ITALY
—Pvt. Hobart Handsaker, messenger from Springfield, is serving with the 349th infantry regiment, one of Lt. General Mark W. Clark's fifth army units which smashed the Gustav and Hitler lines and chased the Germans from the Garigliano to the Arno river in Italy.

Part of the 88th infantry division, first selective service infantry division to enter combat on any front, the 349th piled up a total of 95 miles gained in 48 days of actual combat during the fifth army sweep up the Italian peninsula.

Known as the "Kraut-Killers," doughboys of the 349th fought across some of the worst mountainous terrain to capture Fondi, key point in the vaunted Adolf Hitler line, and protected the flank of the French Corps in its push across Mountains Ausoni and Lepini.
