Audrey Holliday, ASUO president, was also speaker at the student assembly. She stressed scholarship pursuits and the need for participation in campus activities.

Free Hand Seen For Soviet Estonia

TALLINN, Estonia, (AP)—The soviet Estonian republic, now freed from three years of German domination, will decide for itself whether to adopt the Russian system of collectivization of agriculture, declares Arnold Veimer, president of the council of people's commissars.

"If the Estonians do not want collective farms," he said at a press conference, "they will not have them. But the party, naturally believing in it, will campaign for it by press and radio education."

"And the nationalization of stores and business?" A correspondent asked.

"Small enterprises of less than 10 employees will remain in private hands," he replied.

A land reform which was inaugurated in 1940—30 hectares of land to a peasant—has been introduced. A hectare is 2.47 acres. Veimer was asked how many hired hands a peasant may employ and how many cows he may own.

"There is no limit to the number of persons he may employ on a farm," he declared. "He may have as many cows as he can maintain."

Farm Union Accused Of Following CIO

MT. ANGEL, Ore., Oct. 6.—(AP)—A strong protest against the "following the CIO in all its activities" was made to the officers of the National Farmers union, by members of the union here late yesterday, when the local group adopted a resolution protesting the political policies being followed by national officers, and stopping collection of part of the group's dues which would regularly go to the national organization.

The resolution said the national officers have "accepted prominent places on the CIO political action committee, thus lending their official support to partisan able action we can no longer lend."

"Through the national farmers' union papers they are constantly spreading a propaganda of hate and dissension," the resolution continued.

4-H Club Exposition Will Open Tuesday

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Plans are nearing completion for the Oregon 4-H club exposition Tuesday through Thursday, and the annual 4-H and open class Pacific international fat stock show and sale at the Portland union stock yard, Wednesday through Friday.

L. J. Allen, assistant 4-H state leader, has announced that 517 animals have been entered in the fat stock sale by 4-H members, and show superintendent R. L. Clark, secretary of the Portland livestock exchange, reports some 100 entries in the open class.

Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state 4-H leader, announced that some 1400 projects from all sections of the state will be judged Monday afternoon. Besides the displays, style reviews, cooking and clothing demonstrations will be presented.

Used School Bus Sale Restrictions Lifted

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—The office of defense transportation announced revocation of restrictions on the sale of second-hand school buses and other local passenger transportation equipment effective Oct. 15.

Such equipment, including streetcars, trolley coaches, buses and trucks converted for passenger use, has been in the services in which it was engaged on March 17, 1943, prior to ODT was required sale. This procurement can be suspended now, the agency said, because of continuing improvement in the production of passenger equipment.

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
