Portland Sewer Bond Bids All Too High

PORTLAND, Oct. 11.—(AP)—City officials said today that the lowest bid on Portland's \$12,000,000 bond issue to build a sewage disposal plant was too high.

Low bidder on the largest bond issue in this city's history was Harris Trust and Savings bank of Chicago, with an interest rate

of 1.49795 per cent. The city council, which will decide tomorrow whether to award the bid, pointed out that the city would lose about \$30,000 a year by paying the proposed interest while receiving only 1.25 per cent interest from war bonds. The city planned to invest the money in bonds until construction could be started.

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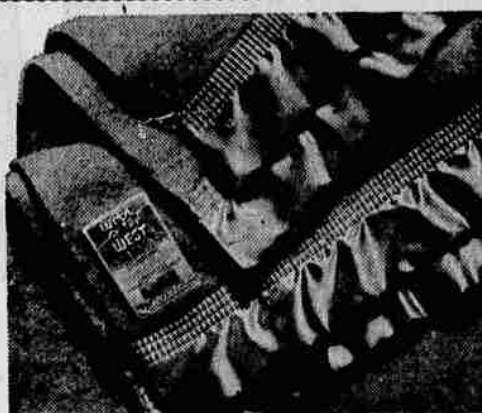
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
