

British Farms Like Oregon, Says Stockman

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Great Britain has a big market for American production, says Rep. Stockman (R-Ore.) but he doesn't believe that there is either desire or income sufficient to raise any hopes among American exporters.

Stockman has just returned from a visit in England, Scotland, Ireland and France. As a farmer, he made a special effort to observe agricultural conditions; as a legislator, he found one thing in parliamentary practice that he believes would be utilized by congress.

"I think we ought to have something like the British question time," he said in an interview. "It's a period when members can question administration representatives directly from the floor."

Europe's farms reminded Stockman somewhat of the Willamette valley in Oregon in casual appearance, except that they are smaller and bordered by hedgerows, instead of fences. A lack of sunshine, he said, limits their productivity and a lack of modern equipment and conveniences, and methods offered other contrasts with Oregon agriculture.

He noted one thing in favor of British agriculture—a lack of erosion. Grass grows throughout the year, everywhere, so there is little mud in the streams even after a heavy rain, he said. But the lack of variety of vegetables was evident. Stockman noted that potatoes, cauliflower and cabbage were available in quantities, such things as carrots and beets seemed to be luxuries and he saw not a single stalk of corn.

Corn was served, however, at one dinner Stockman attended. "I was a little embarrassed," he said, "when I learned that the nubby little ears that evidently had been secured as a compliment to us Americans, cost 80 cents apiece."

Stockman visited one Scottish dairy farm at the suggestion of a member of the agriculture ministry. He found it modern and prosperous but felt it had been chosen rather as an exhibit than as a typical farm. The cattle, he said, were Ayreshires "with horns like a Texas steer." The breed, he said, is a fine producer. The place had milking machines, and running water "at least" in the kitchen.

"The farm," he said, "was established by the father of the present owner and one of the farm hands, I was told, came to work on the place under the father and has remained ever since. Another grew up on the place. It seems that, in normal times, there is no scarcity of stable farm labor."

Since there is year-round pasture, most of the farms raise some kind of livestock: pigs in Ireland, sheep in Scotland and England, he said. Most of the farm houses, he added, shelter the humans on one side, the animals on the other.

He said he couldn't help but contrast the Hood River orchards with those he saw in the British Isles. "The fruit over there—mostly apples and pears," he said, "is scrubby. The trees are never pruned; the orchards not cultivated."

There was no opportunity, he said, to examine the agriculture of France but it appeared to be capable of greater variety than the British Isles, because there is more sunshine.

"Everybody in England," Stockman said, "wants Roosevelt re-elected president. That's true on any social level. They just can't bear to lose their Santa Claus."

Rationing Outlined For Commercial Cars
WASHINGTON—(AP)—The OPA and the ODT have outlined procedure under which operators of commercial motor vehicles will receive gasoline rations beginning Oct. 16.

OPA will take over from ODT the issuance of all temporary and supplemental rations for these vehicles. ODT will continue to handle applications for certificates of war necessity or for permanent changes in gasoline allotments.

The revised procedure transfers to OPA most of the rationing operations since the majority of current applications are for temporary allocations, the agencies said.

Jap Strategy Said To Be Long War

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Japanese strategy is to prolong hostilities and make the cost of U. S. victories as high as possible in the hope that war weariness will sweep over America and bring a compromise peace, Undersecretary of Navy Ralph A. Bard said here.

"Regardless of what happens in Europe we still have a tough, major war in the Pacific—a war in which we are just beginning to meet the enemy's main strength," Bard said in an address at a community war fund luncheon here.

"As we move deeper into that (enemy) home area our supply lines will become extended," he continued. "The enemy, on the other hand, will be massing his power in a comparatively small area, with his ships and planes operating close to their home bases."

"Although our submarines have inflicted very heavy losses on Jap merchant shipping, the enemy's requirements in that direction will be greatly lessened as he retreats into his own islands and his supply lines are shortened."

Bard also cautioned against the belief that Japan's war machine will collapse once it is cut off from its raw material sources. He reminded that the base of Japan's economic pyramid still remains anchored in Japan proper and the nearby Asiatic areas of Korea, Manchuria and north China.

war," ODT stated. The order, made effective Oct. 19 to Nov. 19, 1944, by the interstate commerce commission, provides that "after the expiration of the free time provided by tariff, demurrage charges on a box car held for loading which is not loaded or unloaded within the free time shall be \$2.20 per car per day or a fraction thereof for the first two days; \$5.50 per car per day or a fraction thereof for each succeeding day."

The order is similar to previously ordered demurrage charges on refrigeration cars.

Hannegan Hurls Isolationist Charge
NEW YORK—(AP)—Democratic National Chairman Robert E. Hannegan charged here that James Scott Kemper, chairman of the finance committee of the republican national committee—"a position which in the past," Hannegan said, "has been a stepping stone to high government office"—is "an old champion of isolationism and one of the main pillars of America First."

Hannegan, in a press conference statement continuing his attack on "the Dewey camp," said the failure to explain the presence of "men who are known to be die-hard isolationists" has set in motion a wave of defection from regular republican voters.

Kemper, like other isolationists in the Dewey camp, probably this time to keep out of the "eye," Hannegan said. "He has his hired radio spokesmen.
